FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

When and how can I hear the programme?

On BBC Radio 4 (92–95 FM, 198 LW and on digital radio and television). Transmission times: 7pm Sunday to Friday, repeated at 2pm the next day, excluding Saturdays. An omnibus edition of the whole week's episodes is broadcast every Sunday at 10am. It can also be heard worldwide via podcasts or the BBC iPlayer (go to the Archers website: bbc.co.uk/archers).

How many people listen?

Nearly five million every week in the UK alone. *The Archers* is the most popular non-news programme on BBC Radio 4, and the most-listened-to BBC programme online.

How long has it been going?

Five pilot episodes were broadcast on the BBC Midlands Home Service in Whit Week 1950, but *The Archers*' first national broadcast was on 1 January 1951. Episode 16,300 went out on the 60th anniversary weekend, making this comfortably the world's longest-running drama series.

How did it start?

The creator of *The Archers*, Godfrey Baseley, devised the programme as a means of educating farmers in modern production methods when Britain was still subject to food rationing.

So it's an educational programme?

Not any more. *The Archers* lost its original educational remit in the early 1970s – but it still prides itself on the quality of its research and its reflection of real rural life.

How is it planned and written?

The Editor, Vanessa Whitburn, leads a ten-strong production team and nine writers as they plot the complicated lives of the families in Ambridge, looking ahead months or sometimes years in biannual long-term meetings. The detailed planning is done at monthly script meetings about two months ahead of transmission. Each writer produces a week's worth of scripts in a remarkable 13 days.

... and recorded?

Actors receive their scripts a few days before recording, which takes place every four weeks in a state-of-the-art studio at the BBC's premises in the Mailbox complex in central Birmingham. Twenty-four episodes are recorded digitally in six intensive days, using only two hours of studio time per thirteen-minute episode. This schedule means that being an *Archers* actor is by no means a full-time job, even for major characters, so many also have careers in film, theatre, television or other radio drama.

What's that 'dum-di-dum' tune?

The Archers' signature tune is a 'maypole dance': 'Barwick Green', from the suite *My Native Heath* by Yorkshire composer Arthur Wood.

How did you get that news item in?

Episodes are transmitted three to six weeks after recording. But listeners are occasionally intrigued to hear topical events reflected in that evening's broadcast, a feat achieved through a flurry of rewriting, re-recording and editing on the day of transmission.





BRIAN ALDRIDGE

Home Farm • Born 20.11.43

(Charles Collingwood)

nyone who thought Brian might take Alife more easily after handing over the running of Home Farm to stepdaughter Debbie and stepson Adam Macy clearly didn't know him. As chairman of development company Borchester Land, he's currently seeing through a multi-million-pound project to provide Borchester with a new livestock market. It's an enterprise not without risks. Any unplanned delays in the development are likely to be costly. At home, family life has brought its own challenges for him and Jennifer. His young son Ruairi, offspring of his affair with Siobhan Donovan, has just started at boarding school, while granddaughter Phoebe is spending a year with her mother Kate in South Africa. Now Debbie has a plan to build a large-scale livestock unit close to the village, an undertaking that's sure to raise hackles. But few would bet on Brian, the ultimate smooth operator, not seeing it through.

DEBBIE ALDRIDGE

(née Travers-Macy, formerly Gerrard) Home Farm • Born 24.12.70

ebbie hasn't always had an easy relationship with her stepfather **Brian**, not least during his affair with Siobhan Donovan. This is one reason why she has been happy looking after Brian's farming interests in Hungary, making her just an occasional visitor to Ambridge. Even so, she has managed to exert her own influence on the running of Home Farm, sometimes annoying her half-brother and farming partner Adam Macy in the process. These days she's getting on a lot better with Brian. She shares his drive and restless ambition, and is clearly impressed with the way he has pressed ahead with the new livestock market. So much so that she's now keen to get his backing for a project of her own - a big new livestock unit on Estate land. If it comes off, she and her stepfather will make a formidable business team.

JENNIFER ALDRIDGE

(née Archer, formerly Travers-Macy) Home Farm • Born 7.1.45

(Angela Piper)

These are unsettling times for the woman ■ who has always viewed family as the very centre of her life. Ruairi, son of her husband Brian and the late Siobhan Donovan, is now adjusting to life at boarding school. Her granddaughter Phoebe - just 13 - has got her wish of spending a year with her mother in South Africa. Jennifer's younger daughter Alice, living in Ambridge with husband and farrier Chris Carter, doesn't want cash from the family to help develop the business. The young couple insist that they will make their own way. All of which has left Jennifer wondering what her role is to be from now on. Even sister Lilian, in need of support while her partner Matt Crawford served a prison sentence, is now busy running a property business with him. There's still one person in need of Jennifer's support - her mother Peggy, whose husband Jack Woolley is suffering from Alzheimer's.

PHOEBE ALDRIDGE

Willow Farm • Born 28.6.98 (Lucy Morris)

ince Phoebe was born in a tepee at Glastonbury Festival, it was a fair bet that sooner or later something of her mother Kate Madikane's freedom-loving spirit would show up. Since Kate moved to South Africa, Phoebe has grown up with her dad Roy Tucker and his wife Hayley, with doting grandmother **Jennifer** on hand. But Kate's return to Ambridge to study international development at nearby Felpersham University unsettled Phoebe. She decided she wanted to leave the village and Borchester Green secondary school and spend a year in South Africa living with her other family. Her decision led to much concern from Roy and Hayley, who suspected the decision was mainly down to the influence of 'irresponsible' Kate.

AMBRIDGE

Though it might be called a 'typical village' in the heart of England, Ambridge has enjoyed a pretty remarkable year. First there was a royal visit, with the Duchess of Cornwall attending a charity event at Grey Gables, an occasion which made a lasting impact on many local residents, not least Lynda Snell. Then there was the last-minute decision of the producers of Gardeners' Question Time on BBC Radio 4 to record the programme in Ambridge Village Hall. Thankfully, the village has emerged from these momentous happenings pretty much unscathed. It's true The Bull is welcoming rather more outside diners than it used to, and the village community shop appears to be attracting a good bit more passing trade. Other than that life in Ambridge goes on much as it always did.

AMBRIDGE COMMUNITY SHOP

fter a few initial teething troubles, the village shop has now become a flourishing community-run resource. Owned for many years by local businessman Jack Woolley, the community takeover was made possible when Jack's wife Peggy agreed to lease it to the village at a peppercorn rent. It's now run chiefly by local volunteers under the team leaders Jill Archer, Christine Barford, Jim Lloyd, Sabrina Thwaite, Shula Hebden Lloyd, Oliver Sterling and Neville Booth. The only 'professional' on the team is manager Susan Carter, who ran it in its former days. A good range of fresh, local produce sets this shop apart from many village stores. Above the shop is a small flat, reached by its own outside staircase. The present tenant is Rhys Williams, barman at The Bull public house.

AMBRIDGE GOLF CLUB

riginally part of **Grey Gables**, it was sold to land-and-property company Borchester Land in 2006, along with the country park. So it's now part of Brian Aldridge's sizeable empire. Under director of golf Leigh Barham, the club has grown in popularity in recent years, though it has taken something of a hit during the recession. Clubhouse catering manager Kathy Perks, who took over in 2008, has extended the restaurant menu, making it a popular lunch venue. It's a facility greatly enjoyed by Lilian Bellamy, who's now sometimes seen there with her partner - in life and in business -Matt Crawford. Matt enjoys a round on the nine-hole course and finds it a good place to do business.

AMBRIDGE HALL

Tollowing a chance encounter with the Duchess of Cornwall during a royal visit to Grey Gables, Lynda Snell - mein host at one of the county's top B&Bs - wasted no time in updating the Ambridge Hall website and publicity material. All now mention the royal visit and Lynda's part in it. There are plenty of visitors who return time and time again thanks to the relaxed atmosphere created by Lynda and her husband Robert. Inside, the tasteful décor is guided by Lynda's powers of feng shui. Outside, a Welsh slate patio (designed by the owner and built by local craftsmen) and mature garden with a 'low-allergen' area, are sources of much spiritual refreshment. The quiet gardens run down to the River Am, where a local naturalist has confirmed the occasional appearance of kingfishers and otters. More active visitors sometimes venture into the paddock to meet the hall's resident llamas -Constanza, Wolfgang and Salieri.

AMBRIDGE ORGANICS

Harcourt Road, Borchester

Though managed by Helen Archer, daughter of local farmers Pat and Tony, who own the shop, the day-to-day running is mostly in the hands of Kirsty Miller. With its aim of bringing the 'farm shop experience to the centre of town', Ambridge Organics was very much the creation of Helen, whose own cheese is sold in the shop. These days, Helen is too preoccupied with her young son Henry to devote the time she once gave to the business. However, the capable and resourceful Kirsty is ably assisted by Anja from Poland. Helen continues to take a real though less handson interest in the business. Like other organic businesses, Ambridge Organics seems to have weathered the initial effects of the recession and is seeing something of a resurgence in demand for its locally sourced vegetables, salads, meats and dairy products, plus ethically sourced speciality foods. Sadly a severe setback at the parent business - Bridge Farm - has taken the shine off recent gains.

BEN ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 15.3.02

(Thomas Lester)

The younger brother of **Pip** and **Josh Archer**, Ben is the only one of **Ruth** and **David**'s brood so far to have shown little interest in the farm. His life is mostly dominated by computer gaming, sport and squabbling with his older brother. But recently he has been seen playing a computer game on farming. David's hoping this may mark the awakening of an interest in the family business and that before long he'll be offering to help milk the cows along with his brother Josh.

DAVID ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 18.9.59

avid's life has been overshadowed by the tragic events at Lower Loxley early in the New Year. Following a family party, David and his brother-in-law Nigel Pargetter ventured onto the roof on a frosty evening to remove a banner. Nigel slipped and fell to his death. Horrified by his part in the tragedy, David devoted himself to supporting his sister as she bravely battled to hold her life and business together for the sake of her twins, Lily and Freddie. But when Elizabeth discovered that David played a key role in the decision to go up on the roof that night, she turned on him, blaming him for Nigel's death. David was devastated. He tried to lose himself in running the farm and in his duties as chair of the local National Farmers' Union branch. But only the unswerving support of his wife **Ruth** has enabled him to keep going. Meanwhile David's sister Shula does her best to heal the rift with Elizabeth.

HELEN ARCHER

Bridge Farm • Born 16.4.79

In the face of disapproval from her father Tony, she decided to have a child of her own by sperm donation. The arrival of Henry brought her real happiness, perhaps for the first time in her life. Family and friends have observed a new serenity about her. Even the way she runs her business - Ambridge Organics seems calmer and less frantic. Perhaps best of all, her father Tony is delighted with his new grandson.

HENRY ARCHER

Bridge Farm • Born 2.1.11

Helen's son – conceived by sperm donation — was delivered by emergency Caesarean section when she developed eclampsia during pregnancy. Though Helen's father Tony Archer had found it hard to accept Helen's decision to have a child this way, the possibility that he might lose them both came as a severe shock to him. He is now devoted to the boy. It's clear to most people in the village that Henry has brought a new serenity to his mother's life. Sadly for some in the community his birth will always be associated with the tragic night that Nigel Pargetter met his death.

JILL ARCHER

(née Patterson) Glebe Cottage • Born 3.10.30

Like all the Archer family, Jill has been shocked by the tragic death of her sonin-law Nigel Pargetter and the subsequent bitter rift between her daughter Elizabeth and her son David, whom Elizabeth blames for the death. To Jill, for whom family means everything, these events would always have been hard to bear. But coming so soon after the death of her own beloved husband Phil in 2010, they seemed particularly cruel. As always Jill's first instinct was to try to heal the hurts that have so deeply damaged the family. Her other offspring - son Kenton and daughter Shula have rallied round in a bid to heal the wounds. But, however long it takes, no one doubts Jill's strength and staying power. As long as there's breath in her body, she'll go on being there for the family whenever they need her.

PAT ARCHER

For this Northumberland girl, dealing with difficulties has almost become second nature. She's not about to let the events at Lower Loxley - however terrible - spoil things now.

TOM ARCHER

his established meat products business, Tom was anxious to marry and start a family with fiancée Brenda Tucker. But Brenda made it clear she was in no great hurry to take this next big step in their relationship. She's rather enjoyed the excitement of working for local property developers Matt Crawford and Lilian Bellamy. All thoughts of marriage have now been dismissed - even by Tom following a crisis at the family farm. A local outbreak of E. coli infection was traced back to Bridge Farm dairy and a lapse in hygiene standards by one of its employees. The resulting publicity and collapse in sales has put a huge financial strain on all the Bridge Farm operations, including Tom's enterprises. He now realises that the urgent priority is not to start a family but to save the family farm.

TONY ARCHER

Bridge Farm • Born 16.2.51

Tow 60, Tony hoped that his life might be Ygetting rather easier by now. BORCHESTER

Cadly Borsetshire's principal market town Thas not escaped the recession. Over the past twelve months, a number of town centre shops have become vacant, while others have become charity shops. Several of the up-market apartments in the smart development alongside the Old Wool Market now display 'For Sale' or 'To Let' signs. The footfall in Underwoods, the town's own department store, has dropped since Christmas. substantially Even refurbished Jaxx café-bar in Oriel Road, though popular, has its quiet days, while Ambridge Organics in Harcourt Road has noticeably more special offers these days. Local business people are hoping the new retail development planned for the present livestock market site will kick-start the recovery when it comes on stream next year.

BORCHESTER LAND

I Inder chairman Brian Aldridge, this goahead land development company clearly has its sights set on big things. The company is currently developing a new livestock market on a greenfield site on the town bypass. The aim is to free up the present town centre site for redevelopment as a retail and commercial centre. It's a bold step for this regional company, particularly as they've agreed to a tight completion date. The gossip is that its former chairman, the disgraced Matt Crawford, who spent several months in prison for fraud, is continuing to influence company policy through his partner Lilian Bellamy, who sits on the board of the off-shoot company set up to run the market. espite the downturn in the economy, this unprepossessing county of farmland and quiet rivers continues to punch above its weight as far as tourist numbers are concerned. Walkers are drawn to the fine range of hills – the Hassetts - while culture hunters gravitate towards the charming cathedral city of Felpersham, with its art gallery and museum. The county's two main newspapers - the Felpersham Advertiser and the Borchester Echo - somehow manage to keep going despite the collapse in the small-ad market. Rigorous cost-cutting has meant a number of journalists have been made redundant. Against the trend, the county magazine Borsetshire Life remains popular and profitable. One of the communities featured in the past year has been the picturesque village of Ambridge in the south of the county, a few miles from the Hassett Hills.

Tony and Pat Archer's long-established organic farm has taken a severe knock following an outbreak of E. coli infection which was traced back to the farm dairy. The attendant publicity has severely damaged the farm's hardwon markets for dairy produce and processed meat products. The economic fallout has been especially severe as the business currently carries a sizeable mortgage following a buyout of the tenancy from **Borchester Land**. On the plus side, this is a family business with a new generation of the Archer family, Helen and Tom, running their own enterprises. Family and friends are hopeful that with the support of their loyal staff they'll turn the business round.

Brookfield is a medium-sized family farm in south Borsetshire. It's unusual in having a wider range of enterprises than most farms in the area which have become more specialist units. David and Ruth Archer have stuck with a mixed farming system, believing it to be both productive biologically and resilient financially. They operate a rotational grass paddock system for the dairy cows and raise high-quality, grassfed beef for sale direct. Arable is managed on contract by nearby Home Farm. Pip Archer, one of the new generation at Brookfield, is currently studying at Felpersham University.

MARTY BRYANT

Lakey Green (Ralph Davis)

Achum of Jamie Perks, Marty is too easily influenced for his own good, especially by the likes of Steve Wilkes, the tearaway brother of Pip Archer's boyfriend Spencer. When Steve stole a car and demanded that his two mates jump in, it was Marty who did as he was told – if reluctantly – and Jamie who refused. When Steve subsequently crashed the car, Marty found himself in court too. Like Steve, he was given a nine-month Referral Order plus a driving ban. If he wants a good future, Marty would be well advised to keep Jamie as a mate but drop the dangerous Steve.

THE BULL

Cince Kenton Archer teamed up with Iandlady Jolene Perks, this once popular south Borsetshire hostelry has seen something of a revival in its fortunes. Following the death of former landlord - the popular Sid Perks - in New Zealand, the pub went into a fallow period. Trade dipped sharply and for a brief time there was a real possibility of it closing. Under the new management team, however, trade has picked up substantially. In the restaurant, the menu has been refreshed and now features a number of foods from local suppliers. These include venison from Home Farm and grassfed Hereford beef from **Brookfield Farm**. The improved catering is the idea of Kenton who also runs Jaxx café-bar in Borchester.

LEWIS CARMICHAEL

Lower Loxley Hall

Pollowing the death of his wife Julia Pargetter, Lewis has mostly been engaged in helping out in the Lower Loxley art gallery and occasionally sampling the Lower Loxley wines. An old friend of the Pargetters, he expected to settle into a quiet retirement of reading and compiling his history of the Pargetter family. But, following the tragic and untimely death of Nigel, he found himself playing a much bigger role in the running of the house. In fact, in the weeks immediately after the accident his unstinting support of Elizabeth and the children helped the family get through this difficult period. With Roy Tucker in place as manager, Lewis is now able to take life a little easier. But Elizabeth's observation that 'Every fine old house needs a Lewis around to worry about it' is perhaps truer than she could have imagined.

ALICE CARTER

Home Farm Cottage • Born 29.9.88

Alice's surprise marriage to hunky young farrier Christopher Carter shocked her mother Jennifer and amused pretty well everyone else in the village. However, the modern marriage of this attractive young couple seems so full of happiness that even Jennifer has begun to see it as a success. After three years at Southampton University – which was not without its difficulties – Alice is now back in Ambridge, and the young couple are together full-time. Ambitious Christopher has invested in a new van and mobile forge, and the couple are saving up to buy the farrier business of Chris's boss, Ronnie, when he retires next year.

CHRISTOPHER CARTER

The son of Neil and Susan Carter seems **L** one of those lucky people on whom the sun always shines. Buying themselves out of the deal meant taking out a far more costly loan, putting the couple under financial pressure. The local chamber of commerce is confident that Felpersham will be among the leaders of the recovery.

The Vicarage, Ambridge

Certainly there's no shortage of these in the parish life of Ambridge's motorcycling vicar. ert's wife of more than fifty years, Freda has been the unsung hero behind the food on offer at The Bull. Over the years, her home-made pies and casseroles have gained a considerable reputation. Following the death of pub landlord Sid Perks, the pub became a less happy place to work, and Freda more than once considered retirement. But since **Kenton** Archer started helping Sid's widow Jolene, the pub has become an altogether happier place. That said, Kenton, who also runs Jaxx cafébar in Borchester, has his own distinctive ideas about the menu. Just lately he has tried introducing new dishes onto Freda's specials board. For the traditionalist Freda, these aren't always a step in the right direction. When she's not working in The Bull, Freda is happy devoting herself to jam and pickle-making for the annual Flower and Produce Show.

LORNA GIBBS

The catering manager at Lower Loxley Hall, Lorna runs the café and shop. Following the arrival of Roy Tucker as general manager, both are being reorganised. However, it's likely that Lorna will emerge with extra responsibilities. Outside work, she helps occasionally with village events, and once did the make-up for the village Christmas panto. She is known for her good sense of humour

The farming press may be full of stories about new mega-dairies, but the small herd at Grange Farm is still making a reasonable living for tenant farmer Ed Grundy and his family. The secret lies in processing the milk on-farm and selling direct to homes in Ambridge and neighbouring villages. The herd was established in 2006 by the farm owner Oliver Sterling, who was keen that self-employed milkman Mike Tucker should have a local product to sell. Oliver employed young Ed initially as herdsman. Following Oliver's retirement from active farming, he helped set up Ed in a Farm Business Tenancy, with low-interest loans to help him get started. Ed has now expanded the herd and rents extra acres from Borchester Land, owners of the Estate.

GRANGE SPINNEY

A newish mixed development of executive houses and 'affordable' homes, Grange Spinney is a monument to local developers Borchester Land. This was the company's first development in Ambridge, at a time when it was led by the now disgraced Matt Crawford. Chiefly a 'dormitory' development for commuters travelling in to Borchester, Felpersham and even Birmingham, it does have a few residents who are active in village life. Prominent among them are the Thwaites, Richard and Sabrina. Richard is on the Parish Council and is a keen member of the Ambridge Bookclub, while Sabrina is a volunteer helper in the village shop.
