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

FIFTY NOT OUT

n Whit Week 1950, the BBC's Midlands Home Service broadcast five pilot episodes of a new, experimental drama series: *The Archers*. Its creator Godfrey Baseley had previously worked mainly on agricultural programmes. He hoped that farmers would listen for the stories, but along the way pick up messages that would help them feed a Britain still subject to food rationing. Baseley achieved his ambition for the programme. But he also created a broadcasting institution that is still reflecting rural Britain in the 21st century.

The Archers' official birthday was on 1 January 1951, when for the first time the lively 'dum-didum' of Arthur Wood's maypole dance *Barwick Green* introduced episode one to a national audience.

Despite half a century of change, the Ambridge of episode 13,169, broadcast on 1 January 2001, would still be recognisable to its post-war inhabi-

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tants. Conversation over the farm gate may now be about genetically modified crops or the world trade talks, but March still brings lambing and in August farmers still hope their harvest will be blessed with sunshine.

The Archers lost its original, educational, purpose in the early 1970s, but it still prides itself on the quality of its research and its reflection of real rural life. The Editor, Vanessa Whitburn, leads an eight-strong production team and nine writers as they plot the twists and turns of the families in Ambridge, looking ahead months or sometimes years in biannual long-term meetings. The detailed planning is done at monthly script meetings about two months ahead of transmission. Each writer produces a week's worth of scripts in a remarkable 14 days. To retain listeners' attention in the early years, Archers writers drew on the tradition of the "cliffhanger" which was so much part of its predecessor, the thriller serial Dick Barton, Special Agent! The modern equivalent are stories carefully planned and structured to captivate today's sophisticated audience.

Actors receive their scripts a few days before recording, which takes place every four weeks in Studio 3 at BBC Pebble Mill in Birmingham. Twenty-four episodes are recorded in six intensive days, using only two hours of studio time per thirteen minute episode. This schedule means that being an Archers actor is by no means a full time job, even for major characters, so many also have careers in film, theatre, television or other radio drama.

The episodes are transmitted three to six weeks after recording. But listeners are occasionally intrigued to hear topical events reflected in that evening's broadcast, a feat achieved through a flurry of rewriting, re-recording and editing on the day of transmission.

In the UK, *The Archers* goes out on BBC Radio 4 (FM 92.4-94.6, LW 198). For decades, troops overseas kept in touch with this little piece of home via the British Forces Broadcasting Service, and ex-pats received cassettes recorded by family or friends. But listeners worldwide can now tune into Ambridge without burdening the postal system or taking the Queen's shilling – via the Archers website*.

In the 1950s, the only website people would have recognised was a spider's nest. But *The Archers* has changed as the world has changed, and the four and a half million listeners who follow events in Ambridge still find it as relevant and compelling as those who tuned in half a century ago to that first "dum-di-dum".





Come the revolution, he'd be one of the first swinging from a lamppost, but shafts of humanity glint occasionally through Brian's well-tailored facade. He opposed the eviction of the Grundys, and he's been on tenterhooks since stepdaughter Debbie's marriage to Simon Gerrard, whom he's sure is a philanderer. Brian should know. JENNIFER ALDRIDGE

(formerly Travers-Macy, née Archer) Home Farm • Born 7.1.45 (Angela Piper)

ennifer, the elder daughter of Peggy Woolley and her late husband Jack Archer, caused quite a stir in 1967 when she became an unmarried mother with her first son Adam (now Macy). She later married Roger Travers-Macy who adopted Adam, and they had one daughter, Debbie (now Gerrard). The marriage did not last, and Jennifer wed Brian in 1976. But when Roger returned to Ambridge fifteen years later, the embers of passion flared brightly again, albeit briefly. While Brian insists Jennifer is nothing but a compulsive shopper, she has been a teacher, journalist and published author. But nowadays much of her energies and intelligence are taken up with worrying about her wayward daughter Kate, and trying to keep the peace between Brian and Debbie.

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KATE ALDRIDGE

'Look, I'm a citizen of the world, OK?' Born 30.9.77 (*Kellie Bright*)

co-warrior Kate, Jennifer and Brian's first daughter together, has always kicked against the claustrophobic constraints of Ambridge, often disappearing with traveller friends for months on end. Having scandalised the village with her open consumption of drugs, she seemed to take a step forward when she toured the festivals with a vegetarian food business in partnership with then boyfriend Roy Tucker. But soon after a bitter break-up, Kate found she was pregnant and fought hard against Roy's attempts to prove himself Phoebe's father. But the pressures of bringing up a child when she still had a lot of growing up to do herself became too much for Kate, and she fled to 'find herself' in Africa. Roy found himself a full time father as a result.

M PHOEBE ALDRIDGE

Nightingale • Born 28.6.98

Product of the rather incongruous relationship between clean cut **Roy Tucker** and dreadlocked, noseringed **Kate Aldridge**, this little mite was born in a teepee at the Glastonbury Festival, was prevented from leaving the country by a court order, has been subjected to DNA testing and was named in a new age ceremony on Lakey Hill. Since Roy took her on following Kate's departure to Africa, Phoebe's life has been rather less dramatic, and Roy's girlfriend **Hayley Jordan** loves Phoebe as if she was her own. But if Kate ever returns from her travels she isn't likely to view that arrangement with much delight.

The most recent to experience the thickening waistband brought on by the Antrobus layer cake was the equally kindly Hayley Jordan, who helped Marjorie recover her confidence at the wheel after a cataract operation.



DAVID ARCHER



Brookfield Bungalow • Born 18.9.59 (Timothy Bentinck)

lthough David is not the eldest son, he was the only one of the children interested in farming, and he and wife Ruth have progressively taken over more of the running of Brookfield. But when Phil decided it was time to retire properly, younger daughter Elizabeth (Pargetter) objected to his plans to pass the farm on wholesale to them. David valiantly overcame the desire to clip his little sister round the ear and tried to find a compromise. But their plans were blown out of the water when Ruth discovered she had breast cancer. David worked as never before to keep the farm running while supporting Ruth through her ordeal. The combination of hard times in farming, Phil's impending retirement and Ruth's illness mean that David faces an uncertain future.



HELEN ARCHER

Bridge Farm • Born 16.4.79

elen breezed through her GCSEs and went on to an HND in food technology at Reaseheath Agricultural College. She now runs Bridge Farm's organic shop in Borchester (Ambridge Organics) in a similarly breezy way. Away studying and working for many months after her brother John's death, she returned to find that his ex-girlfriend Hayley Jordan had become almost part of the family. There was a messy falling out. Organic sausages and yoghurt pot labels became metaphorical weapons, as Helen struggled to regain her influence on the family and eject the cuckoo from the nest. Helen got her way; Hayley is no longer involved in any Bridge Farm business activities, although Pat still has a soft spot for her. So does Helen - at the bottom of Tony's silage clamp.



JILL ARCHER



(née Patterson)

Born 3.10.30 • Brookfield Farm (Patricia Greene)

ro the casual observer, Jill might appear to be the archetypal farmer's wife, helping with the lambing and haymaking, serving on the parish council and delivering meals-on-wheels, while with her other hand bringing up four children - Kenton, Shula (now Hebden Lloyd), David and Elizabeth (now Pargetter). But this staunch WI member and ex-churchwarden has a radical streak, and will often stand up to Phil when she feels strongly on a point of principle. Her adult children - and many villagers - have always been able to turn to Jill for help and advice. But lately she has been in need of a sympathetic ear herself. Seeing her family rent by the quarrel over the inheritance of Brookfield was terrible enough, but daughter-in-law Ruth's cancer was in a different league altogether.



Brookfield Bungalow • Born 13.9.97

When **Ruth** went into labour, keen cricketer **David** was in the middle of the innings of a lifetime, but he was persuaded to leave the field to see his son born. **Jill** has often looked after Josh when his parents were busy on the farm, and with Ruth's illness, Josh has continued to see a lot of his grandmother.



KENTON ARCHER

Sydney area Born 8.8.58 (Graeme Kirk)

lder son of Phil and Jill, and Shula's twin, Kenton has caused his parents a lot of worry over the years. His business ambitions have never matched his talents, although his latest scheme running sailing trips in Australia - seemed to be going well. But when he returned unannounced in 1997, it was some time before he was forced to confess that not only were the Australian authorities pursuing him for a tax debt, but that a marriage of convenience to young, attractive Mel had turned into a love match. Phil had to bail him out yet again, and as Kenton had already had his share of the Brookfield inheritance when he fancied going into the antique business, this handout was counted a belated wedding present.

Sydney area • Born 12.2.72

A ustralian wife of **Kenton Archer**. The family was pleased for Mel and **Kenton** when they heard she was pregnant in August 2000. But given that **Ruth** was undergoing chemotherapy which could make her infertile, the timing could have been better.

PAT ARCHER



(née Lewis)

Bridge Farm • Born 10.1.52 (Patrica Gallimore)

Voung, Welsh and determined, Pat swept Tony off his feet in 1974 and has made sweeping changes to his life ever since. One of Tony's shrewdest moves was to suggest converting Bridge Farm to organic production, a common cause which has been one of the buttresses of the marriage. As Bridge Farm yoghurt and ice cream grew in popularity, Pat progressed from '80s radical to '90s entrepreneur, but she does her best to cling to her principles and be a good employer. The first anniversary of the death of their son John threw Pat into months of clinical depression, but Tony knew she was back to her old self when she came up with ambitious plans to open an organic farm shop in Borchester, now run by daughter Helen.

PHIL ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 23.4.28 (Norman Painting)

on of the late Dan and Doris Archer. When Phil lost his first wife Grace in a stable fire in 1955, he was too grief-stricken to note that it coincided with the launch of something called ITV. Although devastated at the time, Phil eventually became captivated by a travelling sales demonstrator Jill Patterson, and they were married in 1957. After a lifetime farming, Phil planned to ease himself into retirement and spend more time on his off-duty activities; he is the organist at the parish church of St Stephen's and his piano playing often accompanies village productions. But the need to take money out of the farm to buy a retirement house, and daughter Elizabeth Pargetter's objections to the whole deal, turned the Archers into a family at war with itself.



PIP ARCHER



Brookfield Bungalow • Born 17.2.93 (Helen Palmer)

Philippa Rose, or "Pip" as parents **Ruth** and **David** call her, came into the world at 4.16pm on 17th February 1993 weighing 8 pounds and half an ounce. Pip took well to Loxley Barratt Primary School until brother **Josh** came along, when she started to play up. David eventually solved the jealousy by allowing Pip to show off her brother to her classmates. She was old enough to realise that her mother was very ill, and David had to do a lot of reassuring that Ruth was getting better, despite appearances.

RUTH ARCHER

(née Pritchard)

Brookfield Bungalow • Born 16.6.68 (Felicity Finch)

muth came from Prudoe in Northumberland Tto work at Brookfield as an agricultural student, and married David in 1988. Slowly, with ideas such as establishing a co-op to save money on cattle feed, she gained the respect of local farmers. She continued to farm after Pip and Josh were born, with special responsibility for the dairy herd, and spearheaded many innovations at Brookfield. Ruth and David were facing the challenge of taking on the farm on their own when Ruth was stricken with breast cancer, and she needed all her fight to cope with a mastectomy and punishing chemotherapy. Even if she survives, Ruth will face tormenting uncertainty. Will David still find her attractive? Will she be able to have another baby? And, of course, will the cancer recur?

🖛 THOMAS (TOMMY) ARCHER 🖛

Bridge Farm • Born 25.2.81 (Tom Graham)

mommy (he'd prefer you to call him Tom) had a real struggle after his brother John's death, which with awful timing happened on Tommy's 17th birthday. Tommy's desire to fill his dead brother's boots led him to ditch his A Level studies for a day release course at Borsetshire Agricultural College. Pat was dismayed at the time, but it's worked out pretty well. Tommy helps his father on the farm and runs the outdoor herd of Gloucester Old Spot pigs which John established. Pat and Tony understood Tommy's motives when in 1999 he and some friends attacked a trial crop of genetically modified oil seed rape at Home Farm, but when he faced a possible prison sentence for criminal damage they went through agonies until his acquittal.

TONY ARCHER

Bridge Farm • Born 16.2.51 (Colin Skipp)

ennifer Aldridge's brother and only son of Peggy Woolley and her late husband Jack Archer. Tony's daily grind provides the veg for the farm shop, and the milk which his more entrepreneurial wife Pat processes in the dairy. You'd seldom describe Tony as 'cheerful', especially when he is lifting leeks, but he's a hard worker, a good stockman and strongly committed to the organic cause - and there's always a pint or three in The Bull to ease the stresses of the day. For a long time, Tony felt responsible for the loss of his elder son John in a tractor accident in 1998. Each anniversary of the death is slightly easier to bear, but he could do without the need for continual peacekeeping operations between his remaining offspring Tommy and Helen.



JEAN-PAUL AUBERT

Grey Gables • Born 1951 (Yves Aubert)

ead chef at Grey Gables and one of the reasons for its continuing success, Jean Paul's great strength is that he will never compromise. Unfortunately, that is also his great weakness. It is lucky that no-one is better able to defuse a Jean-Paul tantrum than his friend and manager **Caroline Pemberton**. If the bottom ever drops out of the hotel business, Caroline would seem ideally qualified for a job in, say, bomb disposal.

BAGGY

Yaguely New Age and definitely undesirable, Baggy is one of the bad influences on **Eddie Grundy** (as if Eddie *needed* any bad influences, **Clarrie** would say). Baggy is a garage mechanic by trade and a drinker by inclination, with a wide selection of dodgy acquaintances. He has numerous children with his girlfriend Sylvia, amongst them Aslan, China, Sunshine and Buttercup.



BANNISTERS

Felpersham

Trendy café bar where the bright things of Borsetshire go to sparkle. The owner started with just one outlet, but soon controlled five, each with its own character and clientèle. He later moved into the food production business, supplying ready-made items to his previous outlets, and subsequently into marketing and publicity.

(Formerly Johnson, née Archer)

The Stables • Born 21.12.31 (Lesley Saweard)

hil Archer's sister owns a riding school and livery business. Since back trouble ended Christine's days in the saddle, her partner and niece Shula Hebden Lloyd does most of the teaching while Chris handles the office work. Practical and resilient, Chris (as she's known in the family) worked hard with horses all her life, while for many years struggling with marriage to an airy dreamer, Paul Johnson. After his death, Christine found happiness with the altogether more down-to-earth George. Peter, her adopted son from her first marriage, lives away from the village. Chris spent several years persuading George to retire, and then he spent several months persuading her to do the same. At last, they're enjoying having more time together.

GEORGE BARFORD

(Graham Roberts)

A former policeman, George worked for twenty-five years as the gamekeeper at **Grey Gables** and now busies himself with voluntary work as a tree warden. Like his current wife, **Christine**, George is on his second marriage, and he has two children, Karen and Terry, from the first one. He had hoped that Terry might follow in his gamekeeping footsteps, but he had better success in bringing on young **William Grundy**. A straight talking Yorkshireman, George is a reformed alcoholic, so you'll seldom see him in **The Bull**, and then only with an orange juice. He plays the cornet and makes a popular chairman of the Parish Council.

ennifer Aldridge's younger sister. Lilian's second husband Ralph Bellamy was probably the last real squire figure in Ambridge, and Shula Hebden Lloyd acquired much of her equestrian skills under Lilian's tutelage. In the 1970s, Ralph's heart condition forced him to opt for a quieter life in the warmth of Guernsey and so Lilian withdrew from her previously prominent position in the village. Since Ralph's death in 1980, Lilian seems to have found comfort mainly in gin, and in the company of well-built young men. What her son James - born in 1973 and now living in London - thinks about this is not on record. Of course, having two wealthy sisters has made Tony Archer very well balanced - he has a chip on both shoulders.



busy market town displaying pleasant if unexceptional vernacular architecture and sadly little evidence of its Roman origins. property company owning the 1020 acre Berrow Estate. The sale of Grange Farm means that **Bridge Farm** is now the Estate's only tenanted holding. Brian Aldridge is a small shareholder and farms the "in-hand" land on contract to the company. Matt Crawford is a rather bigger one (shareholder, that is), and was without doubt the prime mover in the eviction of the Grundys. This, like all the company's actions are dictated by the inexorable logic of maximising return on capital. They failed to get planning permission for a small housing development, and have discussed a leisure complex, but not taken plans forward. So far, the face of Ambridge has not been radically altered, but Borchester Land will keep trying.

T enant farmers 'Tony and Pat Archer rent 140 acres from the Berrow Estate, with an extra 32 acres from other landlords. Bridge Farm converted to organic in 1984. The dairy's yoghurt and ice cream is sold through a wholesaler and to local outlets such as the Village Shop, Grey Gables and Underwoods. But Pat and Tony would first direct you to their own farm shop Ambridge Organics in Borchester, which also stocks their own sausages and other meat from the herd of Gloucester Old Spots.

Brookfield is a 469 acre mixed farm, which also carries out contracting work for **Home Farm** and the **Berrow Estate**. In 2000, **Phil** and **Jill Archer** decided to retire from the running of the farm and give **David** and daughter-in-law **Ruth** full control (and allow them to move into Brookfield's comfortable farmhouse). But plans were stalled because of family objections and the discovery of Ruth's cancer. Whatever the future for Brookfield, it will almost certainly have to streamline its activities, probably concentrating on dairy and arable.


CLARRIE GRUNDY


SATYA KHANNA

An ex-professional thespian and model for knitting patterns, Larry's greatest moment was understudying the Red Shadow in a West End production of *The Desert Song*. And despite Lynda's desperate decrying, Larry did actually 'go on' in the rôle, according to **Julia Pargetter**, whose stage career once crossed with his. Larry likes to see himself as a ladies' man, but his attempts to romance his leading ladies – notably **Jill Archer** – always seem, sadly, to come to naught. It's probably the cravat.

he grand house and estate of Lower Loxley must be worth a fortune, but say that to Elizabeth Pargetter and she's likely to hit you. What a scandal Adam's birth to the young, unmarried Jennifer Archer (now Aldridge) caused. Although she never publicly named the father, the child's shock of red hair implicated Paddy Redmond, Phil Archer's cowman, who left the village soon afterwards. Jennifer's first husband Roger Travers-Macy adopted Adam, who grew into a sporty, good looking young man. After graduating in agricultural economics, Adam devoted himself to development work in Africa, and keeps in touch with the occasional card and email.



A mbridge's twin town since 1994, Meyruelle shimmers in the dusty haze of Languedoc-Rousillon in southern France. s Phil and Jill Archer's youngest child, was about the politest word her family used when she objected to Phil's plans to pass Brookfield Farm on to David (Elizabeth was to receive a mere token; half a £200,000 house). She protested that running Lower Loxley was like riding a unicycle while tearing up fifty pound notes, and anyway she was thinking only of Lily and Freddie. Fallon was the first to suss that Jolene was having an affair with Sid Perks, even though she found the prospect of her mother having sex too gross to contemplate. Once Fallon told Ed Grundy, who is in her year at Borchester Green School, it was only a matter of time before it became common knowledge. Rich revenge for being saddled with a naff name like Fallon, some would say.

JOLENE ROGERS

The Bull (Buffy Davis)

divorcee and mother of teenage Fallon, rhinestone-clad Jolene has scratched a meagre living on the British country and western circuit, although the recent stampede towards line dancing has proved a profitable sideline. For a while, he courted the lovely **Caroline Pemberton**, even returning to the saddle in an attempt to impress this doughty horsewoman, until to her relief he decided they were better suited as 'just friends'.

isitors to this fine old church, whose history goes back to Saxon times, can hardly suspect the controversies which have surrounded St Stephen's: the installation of a lavatory; clandestine attempts to kill off the bats in the roof; a merger with three local parishes under the care of a woman vicar; to say nothing of the web of Machiavellian intrigue that is the flower rota. 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LYNDA SNELL

Ambridge Hall • Born 29.5.47 (Carole Boyd)

hen Lynda and Robert arrived from Sunningdale in 1986, Lynda threw herself vigorously into village life, wanting to be accepted and loved while simultaneously moulding Ambridge to her green ideals. Even when cycling to work on her old butcher's bike or ruling the reception desk at Grey Gables, her head is full of her latest enthusiasm – and it's a big head, so that's a lot of enthusiasm. As well as various attempts to save the world, over the years she has thrown herself into amateur theatricals, goatkeeping, low allergen gardening, parish magazine editing, aromatherapy and, most recently, Feng Shui. But far from bringing increased wealth and harmony to her marriage, this last proved to be a fad too far for the long-suffering Robert.



ROBERT SNELL

Ambridge Hall • Born 5.4.43 (Graham Blockey)

The indispensable and bucolic Titcombe is head gardener at **Lower Loxley**. He is so busy with the extensive grounds – not to mention the extensive demands of **Julia Pargetter** – that he is never heard to speak.

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BETTY TUCKER

(Pamela Craig)

etty deserves sainthood for all she's had to put up with. Her job as manager of the **Village Shop** and post office provided the only regular source of income for the Tucker household during husband Mike's difficult years, and he's not the easiest of men to live with even when he's not depressed. Betty was astonished to learn that her son **Roy** had become mixed up with the fascist gang persecuting Usha Gupta, but stood by him to see him eventually become a credit to the family. Energetic and kind hearted, Betty is a staunch WI member, and helps out occasionally behind the bar at The Bull. Once a cleaner at Home Farm, she and Mike were bemused to find themselves part of the extended Aldridge family, as fellow grandparents to Phoebe.



BRENDA TUCKER

Willow Farm • Born 21.1.81 (Amy Schindler)

Brenda emerged from the travails of her father Mike's difficult period and her brother Roy's involvement with fascists as a remarkably wellbalanced teenager with an interest in amateur dramatics. After her A levels, she won a highlyprized job as a trainee journalist at BBC Radio Borsetshire. Mike doesn't know where either of his children get their brains from, but **Betty**'s got a shrewd idea.



MIKE TUCKER



Willow Farm • Born 1.12.49 (Terry Molloy)

ike was made bankrupt after he and his wife **Betty** made a spirited attempt at running Ambridge Farm, and then struggled to make a living from his Borchester Dairies milk round and freelance forestry work. He suffered severe depression after an industrial injury in which he lost an eye, but he and Betty were able to use his compensation money to buy their house. Given the increasingly casual nature of farm employment, Mike will turn his hand to anything that pays – pigs, relief milking, fencing, tractor work... He has also run a small pick-yourown strawberry business with Neil Carter, whom he regularly rubs up the wrong way. Although he'd rather Kate Aldridge hadn't been involved, Mike rather enjoys being a granddad, and when Kate left he fought for Roy's right to look after Phoebe.

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ROY TUCKER

Nightingale Farm • Born 2.2.78 (lan Pepperell)

n 1995 all Ambridge was shocked to discover that this bright spark was mixed up with the racists persecuting Usha Gupta, but he realised his mistake just in time and shopped the thugs to the police. Despite this disruption, he achieved good A level grades and in 2000 graduated in business studies and economics from Felpersham University. When Kate Aldridge denied he was the father of her daughter Phoebe, he astonished his mates by going to court to prove otherwise, but had to take on more parental responsibility than he expected when Kate left for Africa. With the help of girlfriend Hayley Jordan, he rose to the challenge of bringing up the toddler. Because he couldn't move in search of a job, he thought he'd have to resign himself to being Grey Gables' most over-qualified waiter until Caroline **Pemberton** spotted his potential and put him on the management ladder.

He doesn't talk about his past – in fact he doesn't talk about anything much – but it involved youth work, which has helped in his training of **William Grundy**.

Like all village shops, it treads a precarious financial path, which causes part-time employee **Susan Carter** some disquiet. But while it stands, the shop provides that essential of village life – a little gossip with your groceries.

Like Nightingale Farm, Willow Farm's land has long since been bought up by others – mainly neighbours Phil Archer and Brian Aldridge – but Mike uses the buildings to house his milk van and battery hens. Neil Carter owns eight acres, where he keeps his outdoor breeding herd of pigs, and has grown pick-your-own strawberries with Mike – when they're talking to each other, that is.

HAZEL WOOLLEY

Last seen in Soho (Jan Cox)

A dopted daughter of **Jack Woolley** and his first wife, Valerie Trentham. The wayward Hazel seldom visits **Ambridge** and when she does she usually causes chaos. She claims to have some connections with the film business – but isn't specific exactly what kind of films. When stepmother **Peggy** tried to get in touch, Hazel was initially very interested – until she discovered that it was only to invite her to Jack's eightieth birthday party. You can be sure that when Jack finally snuffs it, Hazel will rush back to Ambridge with a little black suit and a lawyer in tow.

The Lodge, Grey Gables • Born 19.7.19 (Arnold Peters)

self-made man with considerable respect for his creator, Jack started small in the Birmingham suburb of Stirchley, but has been thinking big ever since. As well as Grey Gables Hotel and Country Club, he owns the Village **Shop** and the local paper the *Borchester Echo*. He has one adopted daughter, Hazel, from his first marriage. He recruited Peggy (then Archer) to be his assistant at Grey Gables after the death of her husband in 1972, and they were married in 1991. She has only recently managed to persuade him to retire properly from the day to day running of his various enterprises. Still active despite his age, Jack enjoys golf and shooting, which is handy as Grey Gables provides for both those pastimes (what a coincidence).

PEGGY WOOLLEY

(formerly Archer, née Perkins)

The Lodge, Grey Gables • Born 13.11.24 (June Spencer)

ust like her wealthy husband Jack, Peggy is proud to be of humble stock. She arrived in Ambridge from the East End of London, having married Phil Archer's elder brother - spookily also called Jack - during the Second World War. In contrast to sturdy Phil, feckless Jack was a dreamer. Peggy took the brunt of his numerous get-rich-quick schemes, and she ran The Bull for many years until Jack's alcoholism proved fatal. A staunch churchgoer, Peggy couldn't countenance the arrival of a woman vicar in Ambridge, and moved her allegiance to All Saints, Borchester. Interestingly, Peggy's daughters Jennifer Aldridge and Lilian Bellamy also married wealthy men. In contrast, Peggy's son Tony Archer certainly didn't marry Pat for her money - or vice versa.
