Easter Saturday, 2002. 6pm. I was at my parents' house in Wiltshire when my wife interrupted a delightful nap (I had enjoyed a *very* late Friday night) with the news that the Queen Mother had died. Twenty-four hours later, the Sunday night episode of *The Archers* included a new scene in which our character Jennifer Aldridge related her mother's memories of attending the Queen Mum's 100th birthday celebrations. It had been seamlessly attached to the existing recording thanks to the brilliant *Archers* team and the wonders of digital editing. I was still in Wiltshire, and my boss Vanessa Whitburn, who had masterminded the reaction by phone and email, was still with her family in Devon.

It was a measure of the programme in the 21st century; fleet of foot, employing the latest technologies, and still occupying a place at the heart of our national life.

The creator of The Archers, Godfrey Baseley,

devised the programme as a means of educating farmers in modern production methods when Britain was still subject to food rationing. Five pilot episodes were broadcast on the BBC's Midlands Home Service in Whit Week 1950, but *The Archers'* official birthday was on 1 January 1951, when for the first time the lively 'dum-di-dum' of Arthur Wood's maypole dance *Barwick Green* introduced episode one to a national audience. Episode 13795, broadcast on 1 January 2003 makes this comfortably the world's longest running radio drama.

The Archers lost its original, educational, remit in the early 1970s, but it still prides itself on the quality of its research and its reflection of real rural life. As Editor, Vanessa Whitburn leads an eightstrong production team and nine writers as they plot the twists and turns of the families in Ambridge, looking ahead months or sometimes years in biannual long-term meetings. The detailed planning is done at monthly script meetings about two months ahead of transmission. Each writer produces a week's worth of scripts in a remarkable fourteen days. To retain listeners' attention in the early years, Archers writers drew on the tradition of the 'cliffhanger' which was so much part of its predecessor, the thriller serial *Dick Barton, Special Agent!* The modern equivalent is a blend of stories carefully planned and structured to captivate today's sophisticated audience.

Actors receive their scripts a few days before recording, which takes place every four weeks in Studio 3 at BBC Pebble Mill in Birmingham. Twenty-four episodes are recorded in six intensive days, using only two hours of studio time per thirteen minute episode. This schedule means that being an Archers actor is by no means a full time job, even for major characters, so many also have careers in film, theatre, television or other radio drama.

The episodes are transmitted three to six weeks after recording. But listeners are occasionally intrigued to hear topical events reflected in that evening's broadcast, a feat achieved through a flurry of rewriting, re-recording and editing on the day of transmission.

With nearly five million listeners every week in the UK alone, *The Archers* is the most popular non-news programme on BBC Radio 4 (92–95 FM, 198 LW). It can also be heard world-wide via the Archers website:

The website has been a particular baby of mine in recent years. Through it, we have the privilege of direct contact with our listeners. You'd be hardpressed to find a more witty, erudite and opinionated group of people. And although we who work on the programme may think we are the reason for its continued success, the real reason is out there.

In her younger days, it was as wife to 'Teddy', who brought the traditions of British administration to the African continent. After his death, she became the bastion of Ambridge's parish council and the PCC, and occasionally deputized for Phil Archer as church organist or panto accompanist. But as she approached her eightieth year, Marjorie started to become more fragile. After many years as a breeder, she had to give up her last remaining dogs, and she became more reliant on Hayley Tucker, who lives in the flat upstairs with husband Roy and his daughter Phoebe Aldridge.



Brookfield Farm • Born 15.3.02

Ben's conception – on a hay cart on a warm June night – was blissfully bucolic. But so soon after breast cancer, the pregnancy posed additional health risks for **Ruth**. Fortunately all was well, and the labour was so quick that **David** had to draw on a lifetime's lambing and calving experience as he became an emergency midwife. **Pip** loved having a new baby to bath and dress, although for a while **Josh** worried that he was going to be replaced. **Ruth** found that as a mother of three she couldn't be as active on the farm as she was used to, which put a lot of pressure on **David**.

ollowing Phil's much delayed retirement and after a bitter family squabble, David and his wife Ruth finally took over the running of Brookfield Farm in 2001. They've struggled through some difficult years, facing falling farm incomes, BSE, foot and mouth and worst of all Ruth's breast cancer, but David has plugged away doggedly at every challenge that has come his way. With Phil's help now limited, Bert Fry getting on and Ruth busy with their young family, David struggled to keep on top of the relentless round of work at Brookfield, especially marketing quality lamb through The Hassett Hills Meat Company – a 'joint' venture in more ways than one. Contracting out the arable to Home Farm seemed like a good idea, although David found relinquishing control no easier than his father had done.



HELEN ARCHER



Bridge Farm • Born 16.4.79 (Louiza Patikas)

and Tony have had a lot of worries over Helen's relationship with Greg Turner. So has Helen, as it took a long time for him to reveal trivial details of his past life. You know; wife, children, vasectomy... Helen's a bit of a dark horse too, although she's also been likened in uncomplimentary ways to other animals, especially female ones. And particularly by Hayley Tucker, who, after the death of her boyfriend John (Helen's brother), briefly became almost a surrogate member of the family. When she and Phil moved to their retirement cottage in 2001, Jill feared that her role at the heart of Brookfield would somehow end. No chance. She continued to run the farm's Bungalow and Rickyard Cottage as holiday lets, and retained her bees and hens in the orchard there. Jill's caring, practical nature is always valued by her family and by other villagers, and with a new grandchild she had plenty to keep her hands full.

Brookfield Farm • Born 13.9.97

Together, they have built Bridge Farm into a thriving organic enterprise with its own brand yoghurt, ice cream, cheese (thanks to daughter Helen) and sausages (son Tom). They even have their own shop, Ambridge Organics in Borchester. Through all this, Pat has retained most of the radical principles that saw her famously replace Tony's Daily Express with The Guardian in 1984. Clarrie Grundy would certainly say Pat's a sympathetic employer, and she's been a good friend to Kathy Perks, even giving her a temporary home after her break-up with Sid.







Glebe Cottage • Born 23.4.28 (Norman Painting)

ho are the yeomen, the yeomen of England? Well, one of that breed is undoubtedly Phil Archer, who retired from a lifetime farming at Brookfield in 2001. When Phil lost his first wife Grace in a stable fire in 1955, he was too griefstricken to note that it coincided with the launch of something called ITV. Although devastated at the time, Phil eventually became captivated by travelling sales demonstrator Jill Patterson, and they were married in 1957. Despite retirement, Phil still lends David and Ruth a hand on the farm, but he does have more time to indulge his passion for music; he is the organist at the parish church of St Stephen's and his piano playing often accompanies village productions.



PIP ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 17.2.93 (Rosie Davies)

hristened Philippa after David's father Phil, and Rose after Ruth's aunt, the eldest Brookfield child is universally known as Pip - except when she's in trouble. Pip took well to Loxley Barratt Primary School until brother Josh came along, when she started to play up. David eventually solved the jealousy by allowing Pip to show off her brother to her classmates. Fortunately when Ben was born Pip was old enough to help out, and enjoyed having a living doll to bathe and dress. When incarcerated at Brookfield during the 2001 foot and mouth outbreak, Pip had some fractious moments. But they were as much to do with her worries about the cows as with the frustration of having to explain modern maths to stand-in teacher Jill.







(née Pritchard) Brookfield Farm • Born 16.6.68 (Felicity Finch)

Juth has always seen herself as a farmer, not a farmer's wife. She came from Prudoe in Northumberland to work at Brookfield as an agricultural student, and married David in 1988. The arrival of Pip and Josh didn't stop her working on the farm, particularly with her much-loved dairy herd, but she had to take much more of a back seat when struck by breast cancer in 2000. A mastectomy and punishing chemotherapy were successful, although the threat of a recurrence hangs constantly over her. Eager to pull her weight after her recovery, she was back in the milking parlour despite an unplanned pregnancy the following year. But when Ben arrived, she finally had to slow down a bit. Even Wonder Woman didn't have to save the world and cope with three young children.



TOM ARCHER



Bridge Farm • Born 25.2.81 (Tom Graham)

om's cooled down a bit since his days as a notorious eco-warrior. In 1999, he was acquitted on a charge of criminal damage, despite admitting attacking a trial crop of genetically modified oil seed rape. This was on land owned by his uncle Brian Aldridge, which didn't do a lot for family harmony. Tom works with his father Tony on the farm. In particular, he runs the outdoor herd of organic Gloucester Old Spot pigs which his brother John established, and he's had some success expanding that part of the business, particularly Bridge Farm sausages. John died on 25 February 1998, which means that Tom's birthdays are inevitably clouded with unhappy memories. Like his father before him, Tom fancies himself as God's gift to women, but most of the time he remains true to his down-toearth girlfriend Kirsty Miller.





Bridge Farm • Born 16.2.51 (Colin Skipp)

ennifer Aldridge's brother and only son of Peggy Jwoolley and her late husband Jack Archer. For a long time, Tony felt responsible for the loss of his elder son John in a tractor accident, but each anniversary of the death is slightly easier to bear. Tony will never be dubbed Mr Sunshine, but he gets a quiet satisfaction from producing high quality organic milk and veg. Wife Pat and her dairy workers turn the milk into Bridge Farm yoghurt and ice cream, and daughter Helen converts small amounts into cheese. The veg is sold to a co-op and at the farm shop, Ambridge Organics. What does cheer Tony up is roaring round the country lanes in his venerable MG Midget ('mid-life crisis', scoffed son Tom), a game of cricket or the excellent products of Shires Brewery.





This large Victorian house with a 17th century core has served as a community centre 'with soundproofed room for rock and roll' and later a field studies centre, but for a long time it remained unoccupied and unloved. The owner **Jack Woolley** eventually decided to lease it to the Landmark Trust. Architect **Lewis** supervised the building's restoration to its Victorian splendour and it is now available to holidaymakers looking for something a little different. As housekeeper, **Freda Fry** cleans the place between lets.





Grey Gables •Born 1951 (Yves Aubert)

As head chef, Jean-Paul is one of the great assets of **Grey Gables** Hotel. But as his friend and manager **Caroline Pemberton** would tell you, he is a bit high maintenance. If Caroline had a pound for every time she's had to talk Jean-Paul down from his high horse, she'd have, ooh, quite a lot of pounds now.



If the phrase 'a friend of Dorothy's' has a certain connotation, then the phrase 'a friend of Eddie's' has a very different one. **Eddie Grundy**'s long time drinking companion, poaching accomplice and procurer of dodgy gear is not known for his liking for show tunes or dedication to Judy Garland. However, Baggy's New Age leanings can be divined when you discover that his children with his girlfriend Sylvia include Aslan, China, Sunshine and Buttercup.



(Formerly Johnson, née Archer) The Old Police House •Born 21.12.31 (Lesley Saweard)

Thil Archer's younger sister. Since back trouble ended her days in the saddle, Chris (as she's known in the family) sold her business and house at The Stables to her niece Shula Hebden Lloyd. Practical and resilient, Chris worked hard with horses all her life, while for many years struggling with marriage to an airy dreamer, Paul Johnson. After Paul's death, Christine found happiness with the altogether more down-to-earth George, and their retirement meant they could spend more time enjoying each other's company. They might even see more of Peter, Christine's adopted son from her first marriage. He lives away from the village, and travels a lot as an administrator with a symphony orchestra, but turned up as the star guest at her 70th birthday party.



GEORGE BARFORD



t's odd that George ended up in Ambridge's former police house, because he was a copper for a few years before spending the bulk of his working life as a gamekeeper. A sort of gamekeeper turned gamekeeper, you might say. George has been a great help to his fellow Ambridge keepers, recruiting and training William Grundy. And William's boss Greg Turner has often benefited from George's wisdom, gained through an early life that was marred by alcoholism and divorce. Like his current wife Christine, George is on his second marriage. He has two children, Karen and Terry, from the first one. A straight-talking Yorkshireman, George plays the cornet, works voluntarily both as a tree warden and a flood warden, and makes a popular chairman of the Parish Council.


(formerly Nicholson, née Archer) Guernsey • Born 8.7.47 (Sunny Ormonde)

ennifer Aldridge's younger sister and the widow Jof Ambridge's last real squire figure Ralph Bellamy, who ended his days in Guernsey. After Lilian's son James (born in 1973) moved to London, his mother seems to have found comfort mainly in gin and the company of attractive young men. The collapse of her relationship with a two-timing golddigging bit-part actor/model called Scott led to her temporary return to Ambridge in 2001 and a bid to regain her youth via cosmetic surgery. Rich, selfcentred and impatient with Ambridge's sleepy ways, she has much in common with Matt Crawford. Jennifer was annoyed when Lilian got into bed with Matt over Borchester Land's planned housing development. It was a metaphorical bed, but we wouldn't put it past either of them to find a real one some day.

Tenant farmers Tony and Pat Archer rent 140 acres from the Berrow Estate, with an extra 32 acres from other landlords. Bridge Farm converted to organic in 1984. The dairy's yoghurt and ice cream is sold through a wholesaler and to local outlets such as the Village Shop, Grey Gables and Underwoods. But Pat and Tony would first direct you to their own farm shop Ambridge Organics in Borchester, which also stocks their own sausages and other meat from the herd of Gloucester Old Spots.

Play traditional darts and dominoes in the public bar, or try the cosy Ploughman's bar. Food always available - enjoy a snack in the bar, or a good value meal in our Family Restaurant. We open at 10am for coffee – read the newspaper over breakfast. First floor function room features line dancing with Jolene (Tuesdays) and The Bull Upstairs (Thursdays to Saturdays) for the younger set, with CD jukebox, occasional bands and DJs. Available for private functions at other times. Outside, car parking, beer garden with Eccles the peacock and boules piste (equipment available behind the bar). Look for the half-timbered building just off the Village Green.'

She tried to get husband **Neil** into a white collar job, only to see him return to the land. EDDIE GRUNDY



Keeper's Cottage • Born 15.3.51 (Trevor Harrison)

A lith his father Joe, Eddie used to be the tenant at Grange Farm. Eddie once hoped for success as a country and western singer but was advised not to give up the day job. Ironic, as the day job eventually gave up on him, and Eddie entered his fifties bankrupt and farmless. Ironic too that he ended up renting a house (from Jack Woolley) that was originally built for a local gamekeeper, as Eddie has been known to supplement the housekeeping with the occasional trout or pheasant from neighbouring farms. Odder still (not Eddie's words) that that his elder son William chose to become ... a gamekeeper. And Ed's growing enthusiasm for drug-taking was soured when Jazzer, the one-time singer in Ed's band Dross, suffered brain damage after taking ketamine. Eddie tries to find work for his son, if only to stop him helping out at their old home Grange Farm for class enemy Oliver Sterling.





Keeper's Cottage • Born 18.9.21 (Edward Kelsey)

The Grundys had been tenant farmers 'since time immoral', and Joe still feels the burden of being the Grundy who lost **Grange Farm** for future generations. He finds there is little that will console him, except possibly hitching up his pony and trap and going for a pint at **The Bull**. (Joe is a devout Methodist, except for the bit about not drinking alcohol. Or going to chapel.) Joe used to suffer from a complaint known as 'farmers lung', but it's been a lot less troublesome since son **Eddie** hasn't expected him to do any work. The Dower House • Born 9.2.83 (Philip Molloy)

The elder son takes life seriously, to the point of being slightly stolid, but **Emma Carter** found him sufficiently attractive to go out with. William is lucky enough to have **Caroline Pemberton** for a godmother, and lives in some rooms at her house. To his father **Eddie**'s dismay, William works as an under-keeper with **Greg Turner** at the combined **Grey Gables**, **Berrow Estate** and **Home Farm** shoot. Sadly, William has a low opinion of both Eddie and Ed. Ever sadder, it's probably justified.



SHIV GUPTA

Coventry (Shiv Grewal)

Accountant Shiv is Usha Gupta's elder brother, and can usually be relied upon to appear at Blossom Hill Cottage when Usha needs cheering up. He didn't really approve of her partner Richard Locke, and when Richard left after that unpleasant business with Shula Hebden Lloyd, Shiv did his best not to say 'I told you so'. Felpersham (Caroline Lennon)

hings certainly haven't worked out the way Siobhan had hoped when she and former husband Tim came to Ambridge in 1999, he to be the local GP and she to work as a freelance translator. The first cloud on the apparently idyllic horizon was when a much-welcomed pregnancy ended in miscarriage. Then Tim became close to the vicar Janet Fisher and as the marriage foundered Siobhan was ripe for an affair. Enter Brian Aldridge. But in April 2002 Siobhan found she was pregnant. She was determined to keep the child, while Brian was as determined that he would not leave his wife Jennifer. The Stables • Born 14.11.94 (Dominic Davies)

aniel is fascinated by animals, and you might think that he takes after his father Alistair, a vet. But Alistair is actually Daniel's adoptive father. The boy's blood father Mark died never knowing that his and Shula's second IVF attempt had been successful, and the pregnancy gave despairing Shula something to live for. In 1998, a mysterious illness was eventually diagnosed as juvenile arthritis, and Daniel is subject to occasional 'flares' of this debilitating condition. No surprise then, that Shula can sometimes be too indulgent of her miracle child. In 2002 Daniel found it difficult to adjust when returning to school after a bout of the illness, and started to bully other children. It was primarily Alistair who could distance himself sufficiently to manage a return to more acceptable behaviour.



(formally Hebden, née Archer) The Stables •Born 8.8.58 (Judy Bennett)

Thil and **Jill Archer**'s elder daughter and Kenton's twin. Shula married Alistair in 1998, after an unwise dalliance with the then local GP Richard Locke, which lost Shula the friendship of Richard's partner Usha Gupta. It was an uncharacteristic aberration for Shula, a regular churchgoer, bellringer and church-warden. Shula's first husband Mark was killed in a car crash in 1994, never knowing that after years of disappointment and treatment for infertility Shula was finally pregnant with **Daniel**. Shula has always loved horses and after twenty years as a chartered surveyor she took over The Stables - as a home and a business - on the retirement of her aunt Christine Barford. It soaked up all her capital and is hard work for limited financial reward, but she doesn't regret the move.

Hayley Tucker nannies for the Pargetter twins Lily and Freddie, and for Kathy's little boy Jamie.





Travelling in Africa Born 22.6.67

or many years, Jennifer Aldridge saw only the occasional card or email from her son, who after graduating in agricultural economics settled in Africa, working on farming development projects. But when in 2001 Adam became godfather to his niece Noluthando Madikane, Jennifer and Brian were delighted to meet up with him in South Africa. In 1967, Adam's arrival in Ambridge caused quite a stir. Jennifer was unmarried and refused to name the father (although Adam's shock of red hair implicated Paddy Redmond, Phil Archer's cowman). Adam was later adopted by Jennifer's first husband Roger Travers-Macy. Johannesburg • Born 1972 (Connie M'Gadzah)

he father of Kate's baby Noluthando proved his commitment to mother and child when he spent a large sum of money flying to be with them in Ambridge after the birth. Caught in the middle of the parental struggle over Kate's other daughter Phoebe Aldridge, Lucas eventually managed to achieve the impossible; making Kate see sense. Jamie attends Loxley Barratt Primary and lives with his mother **Kathy**. Ironically, it was Jamie's arrival relatively late in **Sid**'s life which led to his separation from his father. Wanting to keep up with a lively toddler, Sid started a fitness regime. Newly slim, he caught the eye of local siren (that's not a comment on her singing) **Jolene** (now **Perks**), and Sid went from the treadmill to the slippery slope all too quickly. Jamie idolises next door neighbour **Ed Grundy**, whom Kathy has been known to ask to babysit. But only when the remaining population of the Western hemisphere is unavailable.



(née Rogers) The Bull (Buffy Davis)

olene's lively personality and generous assets I shout 'lock up your husbands' to many Ambridge women, particularly Clarrie Grundy, who once saw this singer and keyboard player make beautiful music - well, all right, country and western music with Eddie. But it's Kathy Perks who should have been riding shotgun, because she lost her husband Sid to the one time 'Lily of Layton Cross' (real name Doreen). Jolene is a natural behind the bar, and much of The Bull's success in recent years has been down to her. She runs line dancing sessions and still has occasional gigs with her band The Midnight Walkers. She's also seen her daughter take the first steps into the music business, although Fallon's preferred style of music is a long way from Nashville.



KATHY PERKS



(formerly Holland) April Cottage • Born 30.1.53 (Hedli Niklaus)

The 4th July 2002 was a difficult day for Kathy. As her adulterous ex-husband Sid got happily hitched to good time gal Jolene, it just emphasised the isolation that had already led Kathy (unsuccessfully) into the lonely hearts' dinner party circuit, and to an unwise infatuation with Kenton Archer. With experience as a Home Economics teacher and at The Bull, at least she is happy managing the cafe and shop at Lower Loxley. Having Hayley Tucker as a workplace nanny helps considerably with son Jamie, too. Kathy survived the disintegration of her marriage only with the support of her close friend Pat Archer. FALLON ROGERS



The Bull • Born 19.6.85 (Joanna van Kampen)

lthough she thinks it's pretty gross, Fallon has more or less come to terms with her mother Jolene first having an affair with Sid Perks, then moving into The Bull and in July 2002 actually marrying him. Following her parents' musical leanings (her father is the country and western guitarist Wayne Tucson), she plays guitar and sings with Ed Grundy in the 'metal' band Dross. Like her mother, Fallon has an uninhibited streak which males find dangerously attractive. But she tempers it with a degree of steadying common sense. This fine old church dates back to Saxon times. Ambridge Hall • Born 29.5.47 (Carole Boyd)

hen Lynda arrived from Sunningdale in 1986 it Wasn't long before her name was prefixed by 'oh no, here comes...', because she was determined to bring both culture and green ideals to poor, benighted Ambridge. She has embraced numerous fads, often with a New Age tinge, and directed amateur theatricals from panto to Shakespeare (although critics say the two were indistinguishable). When January 2002 brought floods to Ambridge Hall, Lynda and Robert were touched at the practical support which villagers gave. Although into his eighties, Jack still enjoys shooting, a brisk eighteen holes on Grey Gables' golf course or a slow foxtrot with Peggy, whom he recruited as his assistant at Grey Gables in 1972. Slow courtship, too: they were married in 1991.

eggy is one of the wealthiest women in Ambridge, but it wasn't always so. Originally from London's East End, she came to the village having married Phil Archer's elder brother Jack.
