FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

When and how can I hear the programme?

On BBC Radio 4 (92–95 FM, 198 LW and on digital radio and television). Transmission times: 7pm Sunday to Friday, repeated at 2pm the next day (excluding Saturdays). An omnibus edition of the whole week's episodes is broadcast every Sunday at 10am. Episodes can also be heard world-wide up to seven days after transmission via *The Archers* website: bbc.co.uk/radio4/archers

How many people listen?

Nearly five million every week in the UK alone. *The Archers* is the most popular non-news programme on BBC Radio 4, and the most-listened-to BBC programme online.

How long has it been going?

Five pilot episodes were broadcast on the BBC Midlands Home Service in Whit Week 1950, but *The Archers*' first national broadcast was on 1 January 1951. Episode 15,047, broadcast on

1 January 2007, makes this comfortably the world's longest-running radio drama.

How did it start?

The creator of *The Archers*, Godfrey Baseley, devised the programme as a means of educating farmers in modern production methods when Britain was still subject to food rationing.

So it's an educational programme?

Not any more. *The Archers* lost its original educational remit in the early 1970s, but it still prides itself on the quality of its research and its reflection of real rural life.

How is it planned and written?

The editor, Vanessa Whitburn, leads a tenstrong production team and nine writers as they plot the complicated lives of the families in Ambridge, looking ahead months or sometimes years in biannual long-term meetings. The detailed planning is done at monthly script meetings about two months ahead of transmission. Each writer produces a week's worth of scripts in a remarkable 13 days.

...and recorded?

Actors receive their scripts a few days before recording, which takes place every four weeks in a state-of-the-art studio at the BBC's premises in the Mailbox complex in central Birmingham. Twenty-four episodes are recorded digitally in six intensive days, using only two hours of studio time per 13-minute episode. This schedule means that being an *Archers* actor is by no means a full-time job, even for major characters, so many also have careers in film, theatre, television or other radio drama.

What's that 'dum-di-dum' tune?

The Archers' signature tune is a 'maypole dance': Barwick Green from the suite My Native Heath by Yorkshire composer Arthur Wood.

How did you get that news item in?

Episodes are transmitted three to six weeks after recording. But listeners are occasionally intrigued to hear topical events reflected in that evening's broadcast, a feat achieved through a flurry of rewriting, re-recording and editing on the day of transmission.





fter excellent GCSE results in 2005, Alice left her posh private school to study Alevel psychology, maths, design technology and physics at Borchester College - insisting that as they were saving on school fees her parents could buy her a car! Blaming the influence of Alice's friend Amy Franks, who sometimes rides Alice's horse Spearmint, Brian despaired at the prospect of his daughter communing with the college's hirsute Neanderthals - and that was just the lecturers. Alice plans to spend her gap year (another educational innovation that Brian could do without) in South Africa, assisting sister Kate Madikane at an AIDS project. Alice would like to see more of her (half) sister Debbie, and fortunately thinks that having a gay (half) brother - Adam Macy - is pretty cool.





Home Farm • Born 20.11.43

oes restless Brian have a psychological need to stir things up? He's flirted with danger in the past, mainly by flirting with women – and it's often not stopped there (just ask Caroline Sterling). But as soon as Debbie was reconciled, Brian started pitting her against her halfbrother **Adam Macy** for influence on the farm. But he turned out as much lecher as lecturer and the marriage collapsed in 2002. Six months later, unable to accept Brian's own extra-marital affair, bruised Debbie fled Home Farm for a job in France. Her return in 2004 generated continued friction with half-brother Adam Macy, as Brian played power games with the siblings. In 2005, Debbie took a job running a farm in Hungary for a consortium including Brian, and the following year Adam was further irritated when Matt Crawford put her in charge of the **Estate** land.







(formerly Travers-Macy, née Archer) . Home Farm • Born 7.1.45

Our children by three fathers? What council-L estate Chavette is this? Well, put your prejudices on hold and meet Jennifer Aldridge; elegantly dressed and spoken, former teacher and writer, keeper of the Ambridge website, splendid cook and loyal wife. Pregnant by a local farm hand, unmarried Jennifer gave birth to Adam (now Macy) in 1967. She later married Roger Travers-Macy, who adopted Adam. They had a daughter **Debbie** but the marriage didn't last and Jennifer wed Brian in 1976. More daughters followed: Alice and Kate (now Madikane) who by the age of 20 was taking after her mother with two children by two different fathers (Jennifer regularly looks after Phoebe). Although devastated by Brian's affair and the discovery of his son, doughty Jennifer fought for – and kept – her husband.

But dream home it is, self-built by Neil (with the assistance of professional tradesmen and his friend and nearneighbour Mike Tucker) on Neil's few acres at Willow Farm. The house was completed in May 2005 and features luxuries that the Carters could only imagine in their former ex-council property at 1, The Green, including an en suite bathroom, downstairs loo, cloakroom and 'utility'. When naming the place, Susan ignored the nearest external landmark, choosing the romantic 'Ambridge View' rather than the justas-accurate 'Pig Ark Pong'.



MARJORIE ANTROBUS



The Laurels • Born 1922

(Margot Boyd)

A fter a lifetime of independence and service – initially to the Empire as a colonial wife in Kenya and elsewhere, and later to Ambridge through the church and parish council – Marjorie finally moved into a nursing home in 2003. Although physically frail, mentally she is as sharp as ever and organises her fellow residents much as she used to her pack of champion Afghan hounds.





Brookfield Farm • Born 15.3.02

(Thomas Lester)

A lthough they are used to breeding replacement heifers for the dairy herd, **David** and **Ruth** had to assure **Josh** that the same principle didn't apply when they produced a younger sibling. Anyway, the new one turned out to be male, so would have been a rubbish milker. Dark-haired and lively, Ben started at Loxley Barrett Primary in September 2006.





Brookfield Farm • Born 18.9.59

(Timothy Bentinck)

avid is husband to Ruth, devoted father to Pip, Josh and Ben and a stalwart of the Ambridge cricket team. Having taken on Brookfield Farm in 2001 (much to the disgruntlement of squabbly siblings Elizabeth Pargetter and Kenton) it seemed like a good idea to recruit specialist herdsman Sam Batton to maximise the revenue from their expanded dairy herd. But when David's former fiancée Sophie Barlow reappeared, obviously interested in David, it inflamed Ruth's affinity with Sam into something stronger. David hasn't always made the wisest choices; shooting a badger was never going to be a great career move for a parish councillor, even with the farm paralysed by TB. But coping with Sophie's advances was to be his toughest test yet.





Bridge Farm • Born 16.4.79

(Louiza Patikas)

Telen looked set to carry on her mother **Pat**'s pioneering work, taking an HND in food technology, developing Borsetshire Blue cheese and managing the farm's shop Ambridge Organics. But Helen struggled in a difficult relationship with local gamekeeper Greg Turner who, faced by one setback after another (including despairing Helen walking out on him), eventually took his own life in 2004. The grief and guilt were almost impossible to bear. Despite the support of Pat, Tony and brother Tom, Helen's need for control manifested itself in a life-threatening eating disorder. She was lucky to be admitted to a specialist clinic, which was slowly able to turn tortured Helen round and return her to her grateful family.







(née Patterson) • Glebe Cottage Born 3.10.30

(Patricia Greene)

Seeing her with husband Phil, the casual Sobserver might easily pop Jill into the pigeonhole marked 'farmer's wife (retired)'. Over 40 years she's done much to merit that label, raising Kenton, Shula (now Hebden Lloyd), David and Elizabeth (now Pargetter) while helping with village life and on the farm – in fact she still tends Brookfield's bees and hens. But there's more to the woman than these traditional values. Jill's radical streak is seen in her opposition to hunting and to private education, and in a more recent campaign to rid the local school of junk food.

JOSH ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 13.9.97

(George Bingham)

Like many small boys, David and Ruth's middle child has occasional wild enthusiasms. Previously attached to a charming plaything called a Killer Borg, in 2006 Josh took pity on an abandoned muntjac deer. Against their better judgement, his parents succumbed to Josh's piteous pestering and for a while the lad did keep his promise to look after 'Monty', even sharing his bed with him, to Bert Fry's considerable disapproval. But eventually the novelty faded, so the beast was found a new home at Lower Loxley Hall. Monty, that is; not Josh.







The flat above Jaxx Caff • Born 8.8.58 (Richard Attlee)

T f Shula Hebden Lloyd is a Cliff Richard sin-L gle, then her twin Kenton is the novelty Bside featuring The Young Ones. After a spell in the merchant navy, with at least two failed businesses behind him, and having been bailed out on several occasions by parents Phil and Jill, Kenton returned from Australia when his wife Mel threw him out. He was lucky to be able to persuade Jack Woolley to give him a job managing Jaxx Caff, and doubly so when the new owners agreed to keep him on in 2005. Kenton means well, but he has the attention span of a mayfly. It's probably just as well that his daughter Meriel lives in New Zealand, and that the woman with whom he is most frequently involved is the level-headed Kathy Perks.





(née Lewis) • Bridge Farm Born 10.1.52

(Patricia Gallimore)

Pat and Tony were pioneers of the modern organic movement, eschewing chemicals at Bridge Farm as far back as 1984, but Pat's generally seen as the more go-ahead of the two – even by Tony. Her main responsibility is processing the farm's milk into yogurt and ice cream. But in 2006, fed up with Tony moaning about how many of his carrots were failing to meet the supermarkets' stringent size restrictions, she took the initiative and started to market them in the farm's own specially printed packaging. Even doubting Tony was eventually won over by the project, proof that Pat still had a drive to supply high quality food.





Glebe Cottage • Born 23.4.28

(Norman Painting)

orn on St George's Day, Phil is the type seen by many as the backbone of rural England. The son of yeoman farming stock, he built up Brookfield Farm in the sixties and seventies and still lends a hand under the management of son **David** and daughter-in-law Ruth. He's a staunch churchgoer – in fact, he's the church organist - and his marriage to Jill has been one of the most stable relationships in the village. In his retirement, Phil is very active, looking after Brookfield's previously neglected garden as well as his own; and his piano playing is always in demand for village productions. Altogether an admirable man, then. If he has a fault, his indulgence for granddaughter Pip's musical activities means he occasionally overestimates the actual extent of her talents.







Brookfield Farm • Born 17.2.93

(Helen Monks)

Pip has reached the age that parents wish could be fast-forwarded, when the simplest request can be met with stentorian huffing and vertebrae-threatening head tossing. Ruth and David are resigned to toughing it out. As can often be the case at this tricky time, Pip sometimes gets on better with grandfather Phil, especially as she has inherited some of his musical talent. As well as playing the piano and clarinet, Pip sings in the choir at Borchester Green school with her friend Izzy.







(née Pritchard) • Born 16.6.68 Brookfield Farm

(Felicity Finch)

R with has been a fixture at Brookfield since she arrived from Prudoe in Northumberland in 1987, first as an agricultural student and then as David's wife. She was forced to take a progressively less hands-on role on the farm following the welcome arrival of Pip, Josh and Ben and the absolutely unwelcome arrival of breast cancer in 2000, which required punishing chemotherapy and a mastectomy. In 2006 she started to redress the balance, insisting that David become more acquainted with the dishwasher and the kids' homework timetables. But this brought her into ever-closer contact with Brookfield herdsman Sam Batton, setting the scene for a radical threat to the Archer marriage.





Bridge Farm • Born 25.2.81

(Tom Graham)

Tom had something of an *annus borribilis* in 2005. His organic pork and sausage business (which he'd built up since his brother John's tragic death in 1998) collapsed when Tom's biggest customer summarily de-listed him. And to add insult to penury, Tamsin – the woman for whom Tom had chucked long-time girlfriend Kirsty Miller - de-listed him romantically as well. He was lucky on two counts. His hard-nosed uncle Brian Aldridge helped Tom rebuild the business, despite friction with Tom's more idealistic parents Pat and Tony. And Tom grew close to **Brenda Tucker**, the sister of his friend Roy. With a mobile catering business - Gourmet Grills - helping to publicise his products and an increasing ability to hold his ground with Brian, Tom proved that what doesn't kill you makes you stronger.





Bridge Farm • Born 16.2.51

(Colin Skipp)

ony's sisters Jennifer Aldridge and Lilian Bellamy may have married money but Tony married brains, in the shape of Pat, and it's been an effective partnership. As the back-room boy, Tony produces **Bridge Farm**'s raw material - high-quality organic milk and veg. Pat and her dairy workers turn the milk into yoghurt and ice cream, and daughter **Helen** converts small amounts into cheese. The veg is sold to a co-op, through their own box scheme and at the farm's shop Ambridge Organics. Tony is one of life's plodders but, like the fabled tortoise, he's not done too badly overall. And he would proudly point to his classic MG Midget as evidence that he's still 'got it' - whatever 'it' is.



ARKWRIGHT HALL



This large Victorian house with a seven-teenth-century core has served as a community centre 'with soundproofed room for rock and roll' and later a field studies centre, but for a long time it remained unoccupied and unloved. The owner Jack Woolley eventually decided to lease it to the Landmark Trust. Architect Lewis Carmichael supervised the building's restoration to its Victorian splendour and it is now available to holidaymakers looking for a location with a difference. As house-keeper, Freda Fry cleans the place between lets.







(formerly Johnson, née Archer) Woodbine Cottage • Born 21.12.31

(Lesley Saweard)

hil Archer's younger sister – always known in the family as Chris - was forced to move in 2004 after the horrific firebomb attack on her former home, The Old Police House. Not the sort of retirement she had in mind two years previously when back trouble forced Chris to sell her riding-stables business to her niece Shula Hebden Lloyd. Arsonist Clive Horrobin's target was really Chris's second husband George, who sadly died of a heart attack before they could move into their rebuilt house. Chris chose to stay in Woodbine Cottage, which she bought from nephew David **Archer**, and faced up to life as a widow again. Peter, her adopted son from her first marriage, travels a lot as an administrator with a symphony orchestra, so the family rallied round as Chris adjusted to her new circumstances.

SOPHIE BARLOW

Henley-on-Thames • Born 1962

(Moir Leslie)

his trainee fashion designer, at the time naïve and slightly fey, once went out with lusty son of the soil David Archer. The unlikely couple became engaged in 1986 but the fairytale wedding at Felpersham Cathedral never happened. When Sophie took a job with a London fashion house, her growing confidence made her realise that David wasn't the man for her. If he was honest, David was quite relieved when they went their separate ways. Imagine his surprise when Sophie returned unexpectedly to the area in 2006 after the death of her father. Just as feminine but far more worldly-wise, she seemed very keen to pick up acquaintance with her one-time fiancé as they worked together on a charity project. Flattered by Sophie's attentions, David didn't realise that Ruth's resultant insecurity was driving her towards their herdsman Sam Batton.





Rickyard Cottage, Brookfield

(Robin Pirongs)

irsty Miller had been attracted to sporty Sam for a while, and it didn't take long for them to get together after Tom Archer had given her the old heave-ho. A Devonian, herdsman Sam arrived at Brookfield in May 2004. He does the milking six days a week and is responsible for the dairy herd's health, welfare and nutrition. He's not employed directly by Brookfield, but by a contract company: Paxley Milking Services. Sam is obsessively professional, and very quickly brought the latest thinking to Brookfield. Unfortunately for Alistair Lloyd, this included Sam's insistence that the high-tech world of dairying needed a specialist veterinary service. Despite his reluctance, David Archer was forced to sack his brother-in-law. He might have done better to sack Sam, who in 2006 became dangerously close to David's wife Ruth.





The red-haired, vivacious doyenne of the Pony Club has produced a similarly luscious and horsey daughter, India. Susan Carter nurses the hope that her son Christopher might hook up with India. Jennifer Aldridge nurses the hope that her husband Brian doesn't hook up (again, it's rumoured) with Mandy.





(formerly Nicholson, née Archer) The Dower House • Born 8.7.47

(Sunny Ormonde)

Lilian has certainly ignored the adage 'never go back'. After many louche years as a tax exile in Guernsey following the death of her second husband Ralph, she returned to Ambridge apparently with the intention of teaching her siblings Jennifer Aldridge and Tony Archer the true meaning of the word 'embarrassment'. In 2006 she moved, with her 'Tiger' Matt Crawford, to the home she'd once shared with Ralph and then she bought a majority share in The Bull, the pub in which she'd grown up! Lilian's son James (born in 1973) paid her a rare visit in 2005, but sadly his only objective was getting a shedload of money to shore up an over-ambitious property deal.

Neville born 1942 Ambridge

Neville is a bell-ringer at **St Stephen**'s but of late his nephew Nathan has been making more of a noise in **Ambridge**. Once disqualified from a nettle-eating contest at **The Bull** (for numbing his mouth with ice cubes), slimy Nathan was beaten by **Lilian Bellamy** and (narrowly) **Lynda Snell** for election to Ambridge parish council in 2006. He contents himself with membership – in partnership with **Graham Ryder** – of the world's smallest pub quiz team. The Straighten Arrows are similar to Millwall Football Club, at least in their defiant attitude: 'everyone hates us, we don't care'.

BORCHESTER





his market town lies in the picturesque Am Vale, six miles north-east of Ambridge. At its heart is a historic clock tower and wool market. Pubs and hotels include the comfortable George, the Tin of Peaches (near the canning factory) and the Goat and Nightgown (very lively thanks to its proximity to Borchester General Hospital and Borchester College). There's a good range of shops, including Underwoods department store and Ambridge Organics. Leisure facilities include the Theatre Royal, a three-screen cinema and a municipal leisure centre with gym and swimming pool. Cafés and restaurants range from Jaxx Caff to the upmarket Botticelli's, plus the usual range of ethnic establishments and takeaways. Despite these delights, teenaged residents have only one word for the place: 'boring'.



BORCHESTER LAND



To-one is quite sure what attracted the attention of this aggressive property company to the Ambridge area, but a lot of locals wish it had had grit in its eye at the time. BL owns the 1020 acre Berrow Estate, which includes business units at Sawyer's Farm and the tenanted **Bridge Farm**. In 2003 it converted a few acres of agricultural land for an illreceived luxury housing development: Grange Spinney. All this was under the lairy chairmanship of **Matt Crawford**. Matt enjoys the business opportunities afforded by the Estate's extensive pheasant shoot, in which fellow director Brian Aldridge plays a large part. As Brian is the acceptable face of Borchester Land, you'll understand that Matt is to the countryside what Wayne Rooney is to needlepoint.







nome people say they have trouble finding Borsetshire on the map. They obviously aren't looking hard enough. Stare in the right frame of mind at the borders of Worcestershire and Warwickshire to the south-west of Birmingham and you will discover a charming, predominantly rural county, dominated to the east by the cathedral city and administrative centre of Felpersham. The second-largest settlement is the market town of Borchester. Ambridge lies south-east of the Hassett Hills and falls under South Borsetshire District Council. Bert and Freda's has been a traditional marriage. Freda doesn't just cook and clean at home; she's the mainstay of The Bull's kitchen and is the cleaner at Brookfield farmhouse and Arkwright Hall. Bert and Freda celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 2006 with an unusually adventurous trip to India. Only the most unreconstructed would attribute the longevity of the relationship to the fact that Freda is never heard to speak.





A working farm – although some may dispute that description – until the bankrupt Grundys were evicted in 2000. Ambridge Hall • Born 29.5.47

hey might not like it, but every village needs their Lynda. Since she and long-suffering husband Robert arrived from Sunningdale in 1986, there are few Ambridge activities that have not 'benefited' from Lynda's special touch.
