

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

When and how can I hear the programme?

On BBC Radio 4 (92–95 FM, 198 LW and on digital radio and television). Transmission times: 7pm Sunday to Friday, repeated at 2pm the next day, excluding Saturdays. An omnibus edition of the whole week's episodes is broadcast every Sunday at 10am. It can also be heard worldwide via podcasts or the BBC iPlayer (go to the *Archers* website: bbc.co.uk/archers).

How many people listen?

Nearly five million every week in the UK alone. *The Archers* is the most popular non-news programme on BBC Radio 4, and the most-listened-to BBC programme online.

How long has it been going?

Five pilot episodes were broadcast on the BBC Midlands Home Service in Whit Week 1950, but *The Archers*' first national broadcast was on 1 January 1951. Episode 15,908 went out on 1 October, 2009, making this comfortably the world's longest-running drama series.

How did it start?

The creator of *The Archers*, Godfrey Baseley, devised the programme as a means of educating farmers in modern production methods when Britain was still subject to food rationing.

So it's an educational programme?

Not any more. *The Archers* lost its original educational remit in the early 1970s – but it still prides itself on the quality of its research and its reflection of real rural life.

How is it planned and written?

The Editor, Vanessa Whitburn, leads a ten-strong production team and nine writers as they plot the complicated lives of the families in Ambridge, looking ahead months or sometimes years in biannual long-term meetings. The detailed planning is done at monthly script meetings about two months ahead of transmission. Each writer produces a week's worth of scripts in a remarkable 13 days.

... and recorded?

Actors receive their scripts a few days before recording, which takes place every four weeks in a state-of-the-art studio at the BBC's premises

in the Mailbox complex in central Birmingham. Twenty-four episodes are recorded digitally in six intensive days, using only two hours of studio time per thirteen-minute episode. This schedule means that being an *Archers* actor is by no means a full-time job, even for major characters, so many also have careers in film, theatre, television or other radio drama.

What's that 'dum-di-dum' tune?

The Archers' signature tune is a 'maypole dance': 'Barwick Green', from the suite My Native Heath by Yorkshire composer Arthur Wood.

How did you get that news item in?

Episodes are transmitted three to six weeks after recording. But listeners are occasionally intrigued to hear topical events reflected in that evening's broadcast, a feat achieved through a flurry of rewriting, re-recording and editing on the day of transmission.







ALICE ALDRIDGE

Home Farm/Southampton University • Born 29.9.88 (Hollie Chapman)

The product of a privileged background, this little rich girl had a lot of growing up to do when her father Brian brought home her illicit half-brother Ruairi Donovan. Alice determined to be as independent as possible: she took a job as a chambermaid at Grey Gables (Jennifer was appalled) and applied to join the RAF. A gap year working at an AIDS orphanage in South Africa with elder sister Kate Madikane helped put things in perspective and when Alice returned to Ambridge she'd managed to shake off her feelings of revulsion for Brian's misdeeds. When she hooked up with Christopher Carter, it was supposed to be a bit of pre-university fun. But as her second year at Southampton beckoned, they were still together. Christopher's mother, Susan, can hear wedding bells. Jennifer would be appalled.

BRIAN ALDRIDGE

Home Farm • Born 20.11.43

(Charles Collingwood)

rian has sailed close to the wind in the past but Jennifer always managed to forgive his affairs, partly for the comfortable life he has been able to give her. But when Brian's mistress Siobhan Hathaway bore him Ruairi Donovan and then tragically died, leaving him to care for his son, the Aldridge marriage seemed doomed. Brian's relationship with his other children suffered too. Jennifer was forced to threaten divorce before Brian gave step-son and daughter Adam Macy and Debbie Aldridge management control of Home Farm. With a small child to raise, Jennifer was delighted to have a retired husband to share the burden. Retirement, alas, is not Brian's natural state. But at least the new chairman of Borchester Land gained some brownie points by helping to sort out his mother-in-law, Peggy Woolley's finances and tolerating his sister-in-law, Lilian Bellamy, seeking refuge at Home Farm.

DEBBIE ALDRIDGE

(née Travers-Macy, formerly Gerrard) Home Farm • Born 24.12.70

(Tamsin Greig)

In some ways Debbie used to be closer to her step-father Brian Aldridge than her mother Jennifer was. But Debbie is a straight arrow and Brian's affairs – reminding Debbie horribly of her own failed marriage to adulterer Simon Gerrard – severed the ties that once bound them so warmly. Debbie's farm management skills are much in demand. Joint manager of Home Farm with brother Adam Macy, she also manages the Estate's arable land and a Hungarian dairy farm for a consortium in which Brian has an interest. Happy to keep a safe distance from Brian, she spends most of her time in Hungary, and it was there that she met her boyfriend, fellow farm manager Marshall Latham.

JENNIFER ALDRIDGE

(née Archer, formerly Travers-Macy) Home Farm • Born 7.1.45

(Angela Piper)

Tennifer put her early career as a teacher and writer on hold to devote herself to her family. Pregnant by a local farm hand, unmarried Jennifer gave birth to Adam (now Macy) in 1967. She later married Roger Travers-Macy, who adopted Adam. They had a daughter Debbie, but the marriage didn't last and Jennifer wed Brian in 1976. More daughters followed: Kate (now Madikane) and Alice. Jennifer thought she had finished her parenting and, naturally enough, endured much torment before agreeing to take Brian's illegitimate child Ruairi Donovan into her home. Jennifer is not as soft as she sounds, however. She's Peggy Woolley's daughter, all right, though her resilience was severely tested as she struggled to support Peggy with demented husband Jack as well as helping sister Lilian through turbulent times with and without her beloved Matt Crawford.

PHOEBE ALDRIDGE

Willow Farm • Born 28.6.98

(Scarlett Wakelin)

t first sight, you'd naturally assume that Hayley Tucker was Phoebe's mother, but the differing surnames tell the real story. Phoebe's real mum is in fact Kate Madikane, who in her hippy days had an incongruous relationship with clean-cut Roy Tucker and who now lives in Johannesburg. Phoebe was born in a tepee at the Glastonbury Festival. In Roy and Hayley's care, the bulk of her upbringing has been less colourful, if rather more stable. She's now at Borchester Green. Yes, the secondary school! It doesn't seem five minutes since Phoebe was being christened in a New Age ceremony on Lakey Hill. She was delighted at the arrival of her new sister Abbie Tucker, and they make a lovely, close family, cheerfully coping with the unpredictable occasional visits of exotic 'Mummy Kate'.

AMBRIDGE

Everybody's image of a traditional English village is probably not a million miles from Ambridge. Village green with duck pond? Check. Village Hall? Check. Half-timbered pub? Check (The Bull). Village Shop? Check (just about). Ludicrously priced thatched cottages, unsympathetic modern infill and early morning departures by grey-faced commuters? Check, check and check. Gorgeous views and rubbish bus service? Checkity check. But this icon of traditionalism is trying to play its part in the very 21st-century fight against global climate change. Thanks to the leadership of Pat Archer, in 2008 Ambridge became one of the UK's 'transition communities'. Those unsympathetic developments may also be fewer in future thanks to Matt Crawford and partner-in-crime Stephen Chalkman's removal from Borchester Land.

AMBRIDGE GOLF CLUB

was part of **Grey Gables** until 2006 when it was sold to **Borchester Land**, along with the country park. **Leigh Barham**, the Director of Golf, is highly regarded as a charming man. The other staff include Susan Myers and **Kathy Perks**, who became clubhouse catering manager in April 2008 and finds the job far more hectic than she expected. A good lunch is expected by members. Indeed it's the main attraction for **Jennifer Aldridge**, who was sometimes dragged along by sister **Lilian** in more carefree times. Jennifer's husband **Brian** prefers shooting birds to putting balls, and Lilian's partner **Matt Crawford** has been rather bunkered of late.

AMBRIDGE HALL

AMBRIDGE ORGANICS

Harcourt Road, Borchester

on the farm itself, but the 'farm's shop' – Bridge Farm's, that is. Ambridge Organics is owned by Pat and Tony Archer and managed by their daughter Helen, employing silent Anja and Kirsty Miller, former girlfriend of Helen's brother 'Tom. The shop provides an ethical alternative to Underwoods food hall, selling Bridge Farm veg, yoghurt and ice cream, Helen's Borsetshire Blue cheese, plus a whole range of bought-in organic produce. Tom's sausages, too. Helen's wayward lodger, Annette Turner, has been known to put her undoubted talents as a saleswoman at the shop's disposal.

BEN ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 15.3.02

(Thomas Lester)

When Ruth became pregnant with Ben it was a double blessing, coming as it did after her recovery from breast cancer. Ruth and David have to remind themselves of this when their 'blessed' offspring is fighting with his elder siblings Josh and Pip, or causing the sort of havoc that energetic children are prone to do.

DAVID ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 18.9.59

(Timothy Bentinck)

Tusband to Ruth, devoted father to Pip, LJosh and Ben, parish councillor, deputy chair of the local NFU and stalwart of the Ambridge cricket team - he's just reached his half century. Having taken on Brookfield Farm in 2001 (much to the disgruntlement of squabbling siblings Elizabeth Pargetter and Kenton), it seemed like a good idea to recruit specialist herdsman Sam Batton to maximise the revenue from the expanded dairy herd. But in 2006 David's former fiancée Sophie Barlow reappeared. David spurned her advances too late to stop unhappy Ruth nearly sleeping with Sam. With both third parties off the scene, David worked hard to rebuild his marriage and the farm. If you need to know about the paddock grazing system, he's your man. He's also building a strong relationship with Pip, encouraging her interest in barn owls and even enduring her eco-friendly food fads.

HELEN ARCHER

Above the Village Shop. Born 16.4.79

(Louiza Patikas)

Tor a while, two bereavements caused Pat For a wine, two standards and Tony Archer's daughter significant psychological problems. Her elder brother John died in an accident in 1998 and her partner Greg Turner committed suicide in 2004. Helen's attempts to control her unhappy life led to anorexia and, in 2006, to uncontrolled drinking and partying. Time at a specialist clinic helped her recover from the former. Counselling helped her understand and control the latter. Just as she was beginning to enjoy living over the shop - the Village Shop, not her own Ambridge Organics - Greg's daughter Annette Turner turned up and Helen felt obliged to offer her a bed at her 'compact' flat. She has since assumed the role of disapproving, if motherly, landlady. At least the arrival of charming Aussie Leon reignited her love life - for the time being anyway.

JILL ARCHER

(née Patterson) Glebe Cottage • Born 3.10.30

(Patricia Greene)

To the despair of feminists, Jill Archer would probably describe herself as a mother and retired farmer's wife. It may be defining her by the others in her life, but it is an entirely accurate label. In 2007 she and Phil celebrated their golden wedding anniversary, along the way raising Kenton, Shula (now Hebden Lloyd), David and Elizabeth (now Pargetter). Many villagers outside her immediate family have also benefited from her motherly instincts. But Jill herself would be the first to point out that 'caring' doesn't mean 'doormat'. She'll fight her corner fiercely on important family matters or wider issues such as hunting. She's a committed 'anti', as Oliver Sterling knows to his cost. He has felt the sting from this committed apiarist who is currently less concerned about foxes than the threat of disease to her bees.

JOSH ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 13.9.97

(George Bingham)

avid and Ruth's middle child is growing up fast and adjusting to life at secondary school. Luckily, he has been joined at Borchester Green by plenty of friends from Loxley Barratt Primary. He is evidently developing his mother's liking for pizza. Whether his love of animals will survive his fast-approaching teenage years remains to be seen, but he has tried his hand at bell-ringing, having heard that you get paid for doing it at weddings. Josh and brother Ben had a whale of a time on their father David's 50th birthday in September 2009, helping to blindfold him and chortling happily in the back of the car while being driven round to Lower Loxley for a surprise family meal. Luckily, Ruth was at the wheel.

KENTON ARCHER

April Cottage • Born 8.8.58

(Richard Attlee)

Tenton has been going through a mid-life crisis. Another one. This time it's a tattoo on increasingly flabby flesh, nights out with 'the boys' and plans to transform the homely charms of Jaxx Caff into a sophisticated bar for affluent young professionals. Kenton's partner, Kathy Perks, has always been grateful for the stalwart support he gave her during the traumatic trial of the man who raped her. She's also conscious that Kenton makes a wonderful 'uncle' to her son Jamie. But she was relieved when Jaxx owner Mr Sandlands turned down Kenton's initial plans and remained resistant to Jim Lloyd's entreaties that her partner would make a great bar manager. When would she - and Jamie - ever see him? His former waitress, Emma Grundy, knew the feeling, but her successor, the formidable Naomi, is far less accommodating. His daughter Meriel lives in New Zealand - only just far enough away, according to his ex-wife Mel.

PAT ARCHER

(née Lewis) Bridge Farm • Born 10.1.52

(Patricia Gallimore)

at's been fighting for the environment most of her adult life. She and Tony converted Bridge Farm to organic as early as 1984 and Pat developed a thriving business processing their milk into yoghurt and ice cream. Although plodding Tony knows he's benefited from Pat's militant enthusiasm, there are times when he wishes for a quieter life. In 2008, Pat caused ructions by opposing close family members' plans for an anaerobic digester at Home Farm. Tony rightly predicted that the campaign would cause bad feeling for little effect. Having led the campaign to turn Ambridge into a transition community, Pat is now happily extolling the virtues of the new wetland water purification system at Bridge Farm. If only the lives of her surviving children Helen and Tom ran as smoothly.

PHIL ARCHER

Glebe Cottage • Born 23.4.28

(Norman Painting)

The 23rd of April is associated with three Licons of England: Shakespeare, St George and Phil Archer. Through the 1960s and 1970s, Phil built up Brookfield Farm, finally passing it to son David and daughter-in-law Ruth in 2001. Still a staunch champion of their Hereford beef, he was out promoting it at the very last Royal Show. His marriage to Jill has been one of the most stable relationships in Ambridge. Only his attempts to commandeer the Aga have caused much tension between them. Phil sometimes overestimates his culinary skills, although his talents at the keyboard are still in demand at the church organ and the village-hall piano. He was happily passing on his passion for astronomy to grandson Daniel Hebden Lloyd until racier granddad Jim Lloyd began to divert the lad towards more earth-bound pleasures.

PIP ARCHER

Brookfield Farm • Born 17.2.93

(Helen Monks)

Pip is an earnest teenager who takes up causes with youthful passion. During Lent she would allow no food to pass her lips that had not been produced within a radius of five miles. More appealing to her father **David** has been her keen interest in observing barn owls. Mother **Ruth** appreciates her involvement with Brookfield's rational grazing system. In 2007, Pip joined Young Farmers and enthusiastically threw herself into activities from disco dancing to cattle judging. She also found a boyfriend, Jonathan. But her best friend, **Izzy Blake**, did not join her to do A levels at **Borchester** College, much to Pip's chagrin.

RUTH ARCHER

(née Pritchard) Brookfield Farm • Born 16.6.68

(Felicity Finch)

In 2008, Ruth had a breast reconstruction, I following a mastectomy because of cancer eight years earlier. It was the culmination of a tumultuous period, which could have seen Ruth's marriage to David blown apart by her - fortunately unconsummated - affair with the Brookfield herdsman Sam Batton. After Sam's departure, Ruth returned to her former role managing Brookfield's dairy herd while sharing with 'Dee-vid' the care of their children Pip, Josh and Ben. We can be sure that Ruth could have predicted very little of this in 1987 when she arrived at Brookfield as a fresh-faced agricultural student from Northumberland. No longer an outsider, she has nonetheless offered a sympathetic shoulder to other incomers. Her best friend is Usha Franks, despite the latter's contempt for Ruth's sister-in-law, Shula.

TOM ARCHER

1, The Green • Born 25.2.81

(Tom Graham)

It was only the intervention in 2005 of his hard-nosed uncle Brian Aldridge that saved Tom's over-extended organic sausage business. But their uneasy relationship soured when Brian did a deal with a supermarket behind his back. Prolonged arguments between uncle and nephew were only resolved when Peggy Woolley bought out Brian and bought in to Tom's organic business. The pigs are now back at Bridge Farm and Tom is back with Brenda Tucker. They had a major falling out when Tom was trying to cut a deal with Matt Crawford and Brenda didn't tell him the real reasons behind Matt's change of mind in offering to invest with him. She had overheard a conversation between Stephen Chalkman and Matt which indicated some financial misdealings, so Matt made the offer to shut her up. Tom bravely intervened when he caught Chalky threatening Brenda, and the couple are now engaged.

TONY ARCHER

Bridge Farm • Born 16.2.51 (Colin Skipp)

Tony could whinge for England. Only his nephew Adam Macy can match him for moaning about the frustrations of farming, albeit for different reasons. Tony is still pulling leeks by hand. No wonder he suffers from a bad back. But he keeps plugging away, committed to the organic cause like his wife Pat. At least he's now working for himself and his family since they bought the freehold of Bridge Farm from rapacious landlords Borchester Land. Does Tony ever cheer up? Well, yes, when he's taking a spin in his classic MG Midget. And he still enjoys a pint of Shires in The Bull, which offers endless opportunities to whinge about the size of his mortgage to anyone in earshot.

CHRISTINE BARFORD

(née Archer, formerly Johnson) Woodbine Cottage • Born 21.12.31

(Lesley Saweard)

hil Archer's younger sister Chris – as she's always known in the family - lives a quiet retirement after many years running the riding stables (now owned by her niece Shula Hebden Lloyd) and two very different marriages. Peter, her adopted son from her first marriage, travels a lot as an administrator with a symphony orchestra. After the death of Peter's flaky father, Paul Johnson, Chris found more secure happiness with solid, dependable George Barford. But sadly George died in 2005 while they were waiting to re-occupy their house after a horrific firebomb attack. Arsonist Clive Horrobin was targeting his long-time enemy: gamekeeper and former policeman George. He was sentenced to 12 years, but it wasn't much comfort to Chris, who had to face life as a widow for the second time. In 2008, she became a churchwarden at St Stephen's.

JAMES BELLAMY

Born 30.3.1973

(Roger May)

Lout of the London property market and into management consultancy just before the crash. In 2009 he made one of his rare visits to Ambridge, ostensibly to take 'Ma' out to dinner on her birthday and cheer her up. Against her expressed wishes, however, he made an unscheduled visit to The Dower House to warn Matt Crawford off shedding her assets to pay off his debts. The last thing James wants is to see his inheritance disappearing down a Matt-sized hole.

LILIAN BELLAMY

(nee Archer, formerly Nicholson) The Dower House • Born 8.7.47

(Sunny Ormonde)

77hat a year it has been for the former good-time 'girl' with a taste for toy boys and gin. Apparently tamed by her 'Tiger', Matt Crawford, she was briefly transformed from his pussycat to his tiger-skin rug - to be walked all over while he fretted over his forthcoming fraud trial. Not normally one of life's victims, Lilian finally cracked when her lover abandoned her by the side of a motorway. At the insistence of her sister Jennifer Aldridge, she sought asylum at Home Farm. Even her brother-in-law Brian showed glimmers of sympathy after she astonished him by turning down his offer to top up her glass. But Lilian and Matt were reunited at the Dower House after she found him down and almost out in the bar at Grey Gables. Like Tammy Wynnette, she seemed determined to stand by her man.

IZZY BLAKE

Meadow Rise, Borchester • Born 1993

(Lizzie Wofford)

Tzzy could have gone to Borchester College with best friend Pip Archer. She scraped five GCSE grade Cs and one grade B in RE. But the grind of A levels doesn't appeal to this bright but sometimes wayward lass who once shocked Pip to the core by announcing that she was pregnant – a false alarm, as it turned out. Izzy wants to earn some instant money to pay for all those hooped earrings and crop tops. Above all, she just wants to get away from school. So she's following in mother's footsteps and working on a supermarket checkout. For Pip and her, this could be the parting of the ways – unless, that is, Izzy invests some of her wages on rejoining Young Farmers. Unlikely.

NEVILLE AND NATHAN BOOTH

Neville born 1949 Ambridge

ell-ringer Neville Booth has attracted surprising amount of unwarranted controversy over the years. When Jolene Perks (then Rogers) took advantage of Kathy's absence to have a night of illicit passion with Sid, she parked her car away from The Bull. Unfortunately word got around that she'd appeared to spend the night at Mr Booth's house! More recently, Bert Fry described Neville as a 'Casanova in casual shoes' in the mistaken belief that he was making a play for Freda. Neville's nephew Nathan has a rather more deserved reputation for unpleasantness. Someone should have told him that when you've been caught cheating in a nettle-eating contest (he numbed his mouth with ice cubes), your chances of election to the parish council are slim. 'Slimy' is the word most often used to describe him.

BORCHESTER

Although Felpersham provides most of what passes for the bright lights in Borsetshire, this market town also has much to offer. Six miles north-east of Ambridge, Borchester still retains a historic core, with its clock tower and wool market. Shops include Underwoods department store and Ambridge Organics. Mental recreation is catered for by the Theatre Royal and multiplex cinema (well, all right, three screens) and more physical pursuits by the gym and swimming pool at the municipal leisure centre. And then you can throw all that good work away in many pubs, restaurants and cafes, including, of course, Jaxx Caff, managed (sort of) by the indefatigable Kenton Archer.

BORCHESTER LAND

Tatt Crawford described it as 'the niftiest bit of footwork I've seen in 40 years in the business'. (This from a man with more tricks in his boots than Cristiano Ronaldo.) But Brian Aldridge knew better than to take it as a compliment. Usurping Matt's role as chairman of BL has had consequences far beyond the boardroom. Chief fellow conspirator was Annabelle Schrivener, the company lawyer, who believed that Matt's impending court case could damage the good name of BL. 'What good name?' might be the reaction from many Ambridge residents. The company still owns the Berrow Estate, whose 1,020 arable acres are managed by Debbie Aldridge. Will Grundy is back in charge of the pheasant shoot, one of Brian's pet projects. Other assets include the business units at Sawyer's Farm, although they have now sold the luxury housing development Grange Spinney.

BORSETSHIRE

orsetshire is not exactly a real land relabelled, like Hardy's Wessex, but it has a lot in common with the counties of Warwickshire and Worcestershire to the south and southwest of Birmingham. This attractive rural area is dominated to the east by the cathedral city and administrative centre of Felpersham. The second largest settlement is the market town of Borchester. Ambridge lies south-east of the Hassett Hills and falls under South Borsetshire District Council. The main local newspapers are the Felpersham Advertiser and the Borchester Echo, although the upstart Westbury Courier is making a name for itself with stunts and promotions. The area also has its own radio station named, with impressive clarity, Radio Borsetshire.

Tom has brought all his pigs back on site since the bust-up with Brian. Colin Kennedy has retired from the dairy.

Brookfield is a 469-acre mixed farm incorporating the old holdings of Marney's and Hollowtree. After Phil's retirement in 2001, David and Ruth contracted out the arable work to Home Farm and expanded the dairy herd. Their new paddock grazing system makes the grass more productive in terms of milk yield. High-quality beef from the Herefords is sold online and at the farm gate, and the lamb is marketed co-operatively under the Hassett Hills brand.

THE BULL

eorge Orwell once described a mythical Jperfect pub: The Moon Under Water. We think he'd like a lot of Ambridge's only remaining local. A half-timbered building near the Village Green, The Bull offers excellent Shires ales, genial bar service from Sid Perks (usually) and his statuesque wife Jolene (almost always), as well as Freda Fry's homely food. It still retains the traditional two bars, one being called the Ploughman's. Darts, skittles and boules are played, and there's even a pet peacock, Eccles, in the beer garden. However, Mr Orwell might be bemused by the small cyber area with two internet-linked computers. He'd certainly blanch at the music nights which Fallon Rogers organises in the upstairs function room. And we're sure he'd think the big screen, deployed for major sporting events, was far too redolent of Big Brother.

LEWIS CARMICHAEL

Lower Loxley Hall

(Robert Lister)

Everyone agreed that Lewis, suave and likable as he is, deserved more than a mere six months with Nigel Pargetter's mother Julia, but sadly her death in November 2005 brought their happy marriage (the second for each of them) to a sudden end. Although retired, architect Lewis still does the occasional job that interests him, most recently the deceptively tricky extension and division of the house at Willow Farm into two dwellings. It leaves him plenty of time to lend a hand at Lower Loxley, running the art gallery or even (brave man) looking after the Pargetter twins, Lily and Freddie.

CHRISTOPHER CARTER

Ambridge View • Born 22.6.88

(William Sanderson-Thwaite)

T ike his father Neil, Chris is a keen cricketer Land a bell-ringer. He sounded the death knell for Susan's hopes that at least one Carter would gain a degree when he announced in 2004 that he wanted to pursue a career as a farrier. But Neil was delighted when Ronnie took his son on. Chris successfully completed the four-year training scheme and his developing musculature made him a popular visitor to the area's stables and riding schools. Once Chris had letters after his name, Susan realised how proud she was of him. She also relished her son's close proximity to the horse-owning classes, even though he dumped the Lord Lieutenant's niece Venetia Streatfield to go out with a part-time barmaid. In the summer of 2008 he took up with another 'posh totty': Alice Aldridge. And they're still 'an item', despite Alice being a resident of Southampton during university term time.

NEIL CARTER

Ambridge View • Born 22.5.57

(Brian Hewlett)

Teil lives 'above the shop', which for him is a house he built himself on eight acres near Willow Farm. Indeed, he recently put another £5,000 on the mortgage. Not for a new conservatory, but to cover unpaid bills and clear debts on his pig business. Neil and pigs understand one another. It's taken his wife Susan some time to understand that he was never cut out for an office job. Luckily, his herd of Gloucester Old Spots is organic. It meant that Tom Archer could ask him to supply 30 weaners a month - a business move that may yet save Neil's bacon. Normally easygoing (some would say staid), bell-ringer Neil is tower captain at St Stephen's and ran the mobile belfry at the village fete. Reluctantly, he has come to accept that his daughter Emma is happier with Ed Grundy than with Ed's brother Will.

SUSAN CARTER

(née Horrobin) Ambridge View • Born 10.10.63

(Charlotte Martin)

Tobody needs to buy the Borchester Echo at the Village Shop because Susan supplies all the local gossip. The shop manager and postmistress also supplies villagers with items valued for convenience rather than price. She is married to Neil and shared his worries over the future of his pig business. Susan has known hard times before on the rocky road away from childhood as one of the infamous Horrobins. She even went to prison in 1993 when forced to shelter her fugitive criminal brother Clive. It was a major setback for an Olympic-class social climber who still dreams that her son Christopher could marry Alice Aldridge. Daughter Emma, by contrast, gave her nightmares by marrying one Grundy and running off with another. At least she feels that Ed Grundy is shaping up to provide her daughter and grandson George with a better future.

CASA NUEVA

Farm is in quite an isolated spot, on a lane bordering Lyttleton Covert. Will and Emma Grundy returned from their Mexican honeymoon and named their home 'new house' in Spanish, hoping to lay to rest the ghost of the previous resident. Will's boss Greg Turner had committed suicide nearby. Sadly, the Curse of Greg could not be exorcised so easily, and the marriage was soon over. Perhaps, though, the sun is at last shining in the Casa. After a turbulent spell away from Ambridge, Will has found some happiness living in the heart of the woods for the second time with Nic Hanson and her children Jake and Mia.

STEPHEN CHALKMAN

Borchester

(Stephen Critchlow)

C tephen Chalkman is faced with the prospect Oof an even longer spell in 'choky' than his partner in crime, Matt Crawford - unless, of course, the court believes his claim that the dodgy deals were Matt's doing. At least Matt has pleaded guilty to fraudulent dealings. What's more, he stayed to face the music, unlike the sinister 'Chalky' who disappeared 'on holiday' when the Serious Fraud Office moved into Ambridge. He briefly reappeared to threaten Brenda Tucker to keep her 'trap' shut about what she may or may not have overheard in the office. Chalky is a former member of South Borsetshire District Council's planning committee; 'former' because he once neglected to mention his wife's involvement in a planning application which the committee was considering. The application subsequently became Grange Spinney and Chalkman became a director of Borchester Land, until he took leave of absence.

IAN CRAIG

Honeysuckle Cottage • Born 1970

(Stephen Kennedy)

Ambridge is hardly Brighton, but it must seem like a bastion of tolerance compared to his roots in rural Northern Ireland. With a few notable exceptions, like Sid Perks, most residents find this surprisingly easygoing chef good company when he's allowed out of the kitchens at Grey Gables. Perhaps because of his background, Ian tends to be more private about his homosexuality than civil partner Adam Macy and less comfortable about being 'out'. That sometimes puts a strain on their relationship. Ian has learnt from bitter experience that, rural England or rural Ireland, the bigotry never quite goes away.

MATT CRAWFORD

The Dower House • Born 7.8.47

(Kim Durham)

The prospect of spending anything up to ten years as a guest of Her Majesty does strange things to a man. And Matt's behaviour became very strange after the Serious Fraud Office came a-calling at The Dower House. His lover, Lilian Bellamy, stayed steely in his defence until he took to hurtling around the motorway system and staying in cheap motels off the upper reaches of the M6. She only moved out after he gave her the cold shoulder on the hard shoulder. And then it was only temporary. Once she'd heard what she wanted to hear - that he needed her by his side - she was right back in there. It seems a long time since Matt was the cocky chairman of Borchester Land. Lilian's 'Tiger' looks cornered.

RUAIRI DONOVAN

Home Farm • Born 14.11.02

(Matthew Rocket)

uairi is – in a word that 21st-century mores have made rather archaic - the illegitimate product of an extramarital affair between Brian Aldridge and the deceased Siobhan Hathaway (nee Donovan). When Brian made the choice to stay with Jennifer rather than starting a new life with Siobhan, he imagined that his relationship with Ruairi (pronounced 'Rory') would be tenuous at best, especially when Siobhan moved to Germany. But her death from cancer in May 2007 brought the child - after mighty ructions - to Home Farm. Jennifer made heroic efforts and even Brian applied himself to hands-on fatherhood. Whether their work will compensate for the loss of Ruairi's real mother remains to be seen. At least he now has a memorial bench on which to sit and think about Siobhan when he's old enough.

RACHEL DORSEY

Felpersham

(Deborah McAndrew)

Rachel arrived as archdeacon of Felpersham diocese in 2007. Rachel and Ambridge's vicar Alan Franks have a similar, modernising outlook and she soon encouraged him to embark on radical projects such as the proposal to remove the pews from St Stephen's – eventually narrowly rejected by the PCC. To the consternation of some of the more traditional parishioners, Rachel was very supportive of Alan's engagement to Usha (then Gupta) and in fact presided over one of their marriage services – the Christian one, naturally – in August 2008.

THE ESTATE

More correctly, the Berrow Estate: see Borchester Land.

FELPERSHAM

Birmingham lies some 30 miles from Ambridge, many of whose more recent arrivals commute there every day. But for most purposes the cathedral city of Felpersham fits the bill. Only 17 miles to the east of the village, the county town of Borsetshire is well stocked with shops, eating places and opportunities for night-time excess. It also has a football team, owned by the husband of image consultant Blaize Montpelier, a cathedral and a university. Among its alumni are Roy Tucker and, more recently, his sister Brenda.

ALAN FRANKS

The Vicarage, Ambridge

(John Telfer)

The vicar of Ambridge, Penny Hassett, Darrington and Edgeley is normally a hale and hearty character who roars around his parishes on a motorbike. But he finds himself treading on eggshells when dealing with former friend and ex-churchwarden Shula Hebden Lloyd. He is embarrassed that she now worships at Felpersham Cathedral, having made plain her opposition to the vicar marrying a Hindu. The first marital row between Alan and Usha came when his wife neglected to mention that she had let her former cottage to another of Shula's bete noires, her father-in-law Jim Lloyd. In other respects, the vicar and his missus seem happily married. She shares his love of motorbikes, but not his passion for bracing holidays under canvas, risking the vagaries of an English summer.

AMY FRANKS

The Vicarage/Manchester University • Born 1989
(Vinette Robinson)

my is of mixed race, the product of the Reverend Alan's first marriage to Catharine, who died in 1995. There are feisty genes on both sides of the family. Alan, a champion of social justice, isn't afraid of a fight and nor is Amy's grandmother Mabel Thompson. This led to fiery times in 2008, as Amy clashed with Mabel, who strongly opposed Alan's marriage to Usha. Amy is now in the third year of a midwifery degree at Manchester University, well away from her one-time best friend in Ambridge, Alice Aldridge, who is studying in Southampton. To be honest, the friendship had already been severely strained by Alice's attempt to join the RAF, a move significantly at odds with Amy's radical views.

USHA FRANKS

(née Gupta) The Vicarage, Ambridge • Born 17.6.62

(Souad Faress)

Tsha woke up on her first wedding anniversary in a luxury hotel. It must have seemed like paradise after the week she had endured in a tent, indulging husband Alan's passion for the Great Outdoors. As Usha is a practising Hindu and Alan is the local vicar, joy was not totally unconfined when they married. Shula Hebden Lloyd resigned as churchwarden after her unguarded comments made the local paper (although there's history there: Shula had had an affair with an earlier boyfriend of Usha's). Usha's family struggled to accept the match and she received angry threats from within her own community, bringing back horrible memories of the racist attacks she'd suffered when she moved to Ambridge in 1991. Usha is a partner in Felpersham solicitors Jefferson Crabtree, a determined figure who showed true grit in limping across the line at the Felpersham Marathon.

BERT FRY

GRANGE FARM

Athat description—until the bankrupt **Grundys** were evicted in 2000. The bulk of the acreage was absorbed back into the **Estate** and the farmhouse sold with 50 acres to **Oliver Sterling**, who in 2006 established a small herd of Guernseys to supply **Mike Tucker**'s milk round. Oliver has now retired, and **Ed Grundy** has taken over the farm as tenant farmer. The herd is currently being expanded, Ed has rented more land from **Borchester Land** for grazing and Mike is planning to add more milk rounds.

GRANGE SPINNEY

After much controversy, this development of 12 luxury houses and six 'low-cost' homes was built by **Borchester Land** in 2003 on a few acres of former farmland. Many of the residents commute to Birmingham and elsewhere and don't play much part in the community. Notable exceptions are **Richard and Sabrina Thwaite**, who have thrown themselves into village life – even if Sabrina's fierce competitiveness has put a few **Ambridge** noses out of joint.

GREY GABLES

ED GRUNDY

Rickyard Cottage, Brookfield • Born 28.9.84 (Barry Farrimond)

here be Grundys again at Grange Farm. Well, one Grundy in particular, and he has been working there for some time as Oliver Sterling's herd manager. The difference now is that Ed is running the show, since Oliver gave him the tenancy on very generous terms. What's more, he was already seeking to expand the herd and the grazing land. It looks as though he's determined to repay the faith that Oliver showed in him. This is a young man with a past. He's served community punishments for joyriding and burglary and once tried to grow cannabis in a barn at Bridge Farm with his mate Jazzer McCreary. Ed's had a complicated relationship with Emma Grundy - no, actually she's his former sister-in-law (we said it was complicated). They got back together in 2008, much to the dismay of Ed's brother and Emma's former hubby Will, whose son George lives with them.

EDDIE GRUNDY

Keeper's Cottage • Born 15.3.51

Thile Ed Grundy was gearing up to become the official tenant at Grange Farm, his father Eddie was beginning to mellow and mature in a way that his home-made cider rarely has had chance to do. David and Ruth Archer evidently thought he was trustworthy enough to take over Brookfield for a week while they took the family on holiday. Quite a risk on their part, considering that Eddie's rather slipshod management techniques led to the loss of Grange Farm in the first place. Good job Clarrie was going to be around. Eddie certainly needed the work. His many rural enterprises (landscaping, composting and garden ornaments, to name but three) have been badly hit by the recession. And his more recent wheeze - trying to unearth valuable relics located by a metal detector - was as doomed as his hopes of making it big as a country and western singer.

EMMA GRUNDY

(née Carter)

Rickyard Cottage, Brookfield • Born 7.8.84

he may no longer be running Jaxx Caff Oduring Kenton's lengthy absences, but Emma is still trying to hold down two jobs while getting son George to and from his new school at Loxley Barratt. GEORGE GRUNDY

He was named George after William Grundy's former gamekeeping mentor George Barford and Edward after... well, who? Grandfather Eddie? Or Will's brother Ed, whom Emma mistakenly believed to be George's real father? A DNA test proved otherwise. Not much later Emma was divorced from Will and estranged for several years from Ed. Although resident with his mum, George spends regular time with Will and, rather more problematically with his girlfriend Nic Hanson. When Ed and Emma got back together, Will was so distraught that he had to leave the village, even though it meant seeing much less of his beloved son, who started primary school in September 2009.

JOE GRUNDY

Keeper's Cottage • Born 18.9.21

(Edward Kelsey)

id you catch that tantalising whiff of liniment and home-made cider, with subtle top notes of horse manure and pipe tobacco? Joe Grundy's probably just passed by. Joe was forced into retirement when he lost Grange Farm through bankruptcy, and is delighted that grandson Ed has it back again. When his trap is not being pulled around the village by his pony Bartleby, Joe's content to potter around in the garden at Keeper's Cottage. He also keeps things tidy for Kathy Perks at April Cottage next door. Although he celebrated his 88th birthday not long ago, there's plenty of life left in this old dog. He's struck up an unlikely alliance with his new drinking mate Jim Lloyd, and in 2008 he enjoyed a brief friendship with Mildred Sommerskill, a visiting former resident. Sadly, this was short-lived. Mildred returned to Canada, where she died of cancer.

WILLIAM GRUNDY

Casa Nueva • Born 9.2.83
(Philip Molloy)

If you're the sort of person who likes taking Lrisks, try telling Will Grundy to count his blessings. He has a lovely, healthy son, George, and a responsible job as a gamekeeper. Indeed, he returned to Ambridge bursting with new ideas for the shoot after a temporary exile in Gloucestershire. What's more, he was reunited with girlfriend Nic Hanson. Add to that the inheritance that enabled him to buy 1, The Green and rent it out, and Will should be as chirpy as a lark at daybreak. But he's never likely to forget that his marriage to George's mother was blown apart, thanks to Emma's longing for Will's brother Ed. Spring and summer see car-boot sales, with children entertained by the Berkshire sow Barbarella. And year round you should be able to get a pint of home-made cider, as long as you've a strong constitution and a disregard for the excise laws.

DR DEEPAK GUPTA

Tettenhall, Wolverhampton

(Madhav Sharma)

his doctor of medicine (now retired) was a Ugandan Asian who was forced by Idi Amin's expulsion in 1972 to move his family to Britain. Disapproving of his daughter Usha's settling in Ambridge, he and his depressive wife kept their distance for many years, letting his sister-in-law Satya Khanna and son Shiv be Usha's link to the family. But they won the second — and arguably most significant — round, siding with Shula and funding the boy through Felpersham Cathedral School since 2006.

These include an armed robbery on the Village Shop, after which he forced his big sister Susan Carter to harbour him (for which she served time); a string of burglaries on local homes; and worst of all – a vicious vendetta against former policeman George Barford, which culminated in 2004 in a firebomb attack on George's house. Badly burned, Clive sought refuge with Susan once more, but this time she did the right thing. Clive got 12 years.

THE HORROBINS

6, The Green, and elsewhere

ome think the Horrobins' role in life is to make Othe Grundys look classy. They've certainly had a higher proportion of jailbirds: Clive, Keith and Susan (now Carter) have all done time, and while many felt that Susan's sentence was unwarranted, there was no such sympathy for her brothers. Unfortunate paterfamilias Bert Horrobin is a former road worker and his wife Ivy supplements her pension with cleaning work. Daughter Tracy flits from job to job and it's best not to ask how Gary and Stewart earn their beer money. Perhaps unsurprisingly, Neil Carter feels that 6, The Green isn't an ideal environment for the care of his grandson George Grundy, no matter how convenient it is occasionally for Emma.

MAURICE HORTON

Borchester

grumpy man with a cleaver in his hand is I perhaps not the most reassuring of figures, but butcher Maurice has much to be grumpy about. Having lost his wife, son and a previous business through compulsive gambling, Maurice was happy to give up a tottering one-man shop in Felpersham to work part-time at the business units at Sawyer's Farm. There he makes sausages for Tom Archer, supplementing this with work in a supermarket and butchering the occasional venison carcass for Home Farm. Despite Maurice's moody demeanour, Alistair Lloyd has much to be grateful to Maurice for. In fact, we'd say Alistair's in his debt, but that might be rather misleading, as Maurice is Alistair's sponsor at the Borchester branch of Gamblers Anonymous.

JAXX CAFF

Borchester

here's a corner of an English market town I that is forever America. At least it must seem forever to manager Kenton Archer since he opened a cafe in Borchester with the sort of décor more commonly found in diners off Route 66 in the 1950s. The music is as retro as the surroundings. Elvis and the Everley Brothers feature prominently. Kenton has evidently heard rather more of this nostalgia-on-a-loop than he would like. He would prefer to spend less time serving and more time developing his plans to transform the place into a sophisticated cafe bar. Unfortunately for him, his assistant Naomi will not countenance his frequent absences, as the more indulgent Emma Carter once did. Nor did the new owner, Mr Sandlands, buy into his dreams initially. Could it be second time lucky for Kenton's revised plans?

SATYA KHANNA

At least he has the more wholesome pleasures of village cricket. Even that didn't seem much fun when Adam Macy's win-at-all-costs mentality succeeded his more laid-back approach to captaining the Ambridge team. What's left of Alistair's spare time, after tending to the needs of all creatures great and small, is largely taken up by the far less predictable demands of his eccentric father, Jim Lloyd, since he became a full-time Ambridge resident. The retired history professor delights in winding up Alistair's wife Shula, putting even more strain on family life at The Stables. There must be times when Alistair looks forward to being called out to a cow with a prolapsed uterus.

DANIEL HEBDEN LLOYD

The Stables • Born 14.11.94

(Dominic Davies)

he 'Hebden' part of Daniel's surname comes from his mother Shula's first husband, Mark, who died in a car crash without knowing that his wife was pregnant. Mark's parents, Bunty and Reg, have funded Daniel's attendance at Felpersham Cathedral School, against the wishes of his father (by adoption) Alistair. The lad is now at an age when he can challenge his parents' assumptions in any number of areas. And he's being encouraged to do so by Alistair's father, Jim, who cited the need to see more of Daniel as one of his reasons for moving to Ambridge. The far more stable influence of Shula's father Phil, who shared his interest in astronomy with his grandson, could soon be waning like the moon in September.

Having appeared on a plinth at the village fete as Marcus Porcius Cato, this retired academic seems determined to make the most of his final years. He moved to Ambridge to spend more time with his family. Alistair is not exactly overjoyed at being at his father's beck and call, and Shula found it very difficult to be civil to a militant atheist who mocks her religious beliefs. Daniel loves having him around, however - particularly since his adoptive grandfather allowed him a go at the wheel of the Riley (off road, of course). Jim is drawn to Ambridge's more buccaneering characters, notably Shula's twin brother Kenton Archer.

SHULA HEBDEN LLOYD

(formally Hebden, nee Archer) The Stables • Born 8.8.58

The growing strain in Shula's voice has two main sources. One is the close proximity of her mischievous father-in-law, Jim Lloyd. The other is the ongoing tension with vicar and former friend Alan Franks and his wife Usha. As she drives to Felpersham Cathedral on Sunday mornings, Shula must wonder whether her past sins are coming back to haunt her. She's still reaping the effects of her affair with Usha's former partner, Richard Locke, in 1998. Ten years later, Shula resigned as churchwarden following unwise remarks to a reporter about the planned marriage of a Christian vicar to a Hindu - another blow to her reputation as the solid twin to flaky Kenton Archer. Shula runs a riding school and stables and is married to Alistair Lloyd. Her first husband Mark was killed in a car crash in 1994, unaware that after infertility treatment Shula was pregnant with Daniel.

LORNA

(Alison Belbin)

Loss and Shop Manager at Lower Loxley in 2008. She is Emma Grundy's boss there. She helped with the make-up at the village panto at Christmas. She has a great sense of humour and joined Kathy in an April Fool joke against Kenton. "No Kenton, your tattoo does not say 'Lucky in every endeavour'; it says 'closed for cleaning!'."

LOWER LOXLEY HALL

6 ▲ great day out for all the family!' claim the Iflyers and indeed this impressive mansion with extensive parkland has much to offer; quite a lot of it spawned by the passing enthusiasms of its owner Nigel Pargetter (one of the reasons his wife Elizabeth indulges them). Nigel runs falconry courses and displays with falconer Jessica; the grounds boast rare breeds, cycle trails, an art gallery, a tree-top walk and vines producing Lower Loxley's own wine. He's also a keen horseman; the annual point-to-point was supplemented in 2008 by a gung-ho team chase. And, with its more sober hat on, Lower Loxley welcomes conferences, weddings and other functions - especially with a 'green' tinge. Staff include ancient retainers Edgar and Eileen Titcombe, volunteer guide Bert Fry, retail and catering manager Lorna and Hugh the Orangery Café's chef. Hayley Tucker runs activity visits for schoolchildren, and Emma Grundy works in the Orangery as a waitress.

ADAM MACY

Honeysuckle Cottage • Born 22.6.67

(Andrew Wincott)

dam's competitive streak has come to the fore - worryingly for his civil partner Ian Craig and excruciatingly for fellow members of the Ambridge Cricket Club. After wresting control from captain Alistair Lloyd, he embarked on the uphill task of getting them fit and focused on winning. Success is important to Adam on the cricket field and, even more so, on the farm. Despite his profitable innovations, including a thriving soft-fruit business, Adam has an uneasy relationship with step-father Brian Aldridge. Brian would deny it, but he has difficulties with Adam being gay. Jennifer has been fiercely protective of her son, who was conceived with a cowman called Paddy Redmond and later adopted by her first husband Roger Travers-Macy. In 2008, under severe threats from Jennifer, Brian made Adam and his half-sister Debbie joint managers of the farm, with a generous profit share.

KATE MADIKANE

(née Aldridge) Johannesburg • Born 30.9.77

(Kellie Bright)

77as the former hippy becoming restless again? That's the impression Debbie Aldridge came away with after her latest trip to South Africa to visit her stepsister and her family. Could it be that Kate is missing Ambridge or, more likely, her daughter Phoebe, who now lives happily with her father, Roy Tucker, stepmother Hayley and half-sister Abbie? At the height of Kate's wild teenage days (expelled from school, stealing from home, disappearing with travellers...), Jennifer and Brian must have despaired of their daughter ever settling down into respectable domesticity. When she eventually did, it was in Johannesburg with a black South African (Lucas), rather than in Edgeley with a nice Young Farmer. Kate's children with Lucas are daughter Noluthando (born 2001) and son Sipho (born 2007). She works as a volunteer in an AIDS orphanage.

KIRSTY MILLER

Her six-year onoff relationship with Tom Archer ended in 2005 when he fell for someone else - only for Tom to be dumped himself soon after he'd given Kirsty the 'big E'. While Tom eventually fell for her best mate Brenda Tucker, Kirsty took up with the Brookfield herdsman Sam Batton. She was keen; he was cooling fast, having fallen for Ruth Archer (but that's another kettle of rancid fish). At least Kirsty didn't let the break-up with Tom sour her job at the family's shop Ambridge Organics, where she works for Tom's sister Helen. Tom and Kirsty have managed to bury their past and are on good terms now when they meet at the shop or when she's working part-time at The Bull.

ELIZABETH PARGETTER

(née Archer) Lower Loxley Hall • Born 21.4.67

Ilizabeth might be the youngest of Phil and Lill Archer's children but my goodness she can punch above her weight, especially when she thinks she's getting less than her fair share. Before her marriage to Nigel, Elizabeth had an abortion after being dumped by swindler Cameron Fraser. JOLENE PERKS

(née Rogers)
The Bull
(Buffy Davis)

he one-time Lily of Layton Cross, country I music singer extraordinaire, went through a riot of emotions after former husband and fellow musician Wayne Tucson turned up at The Bull, homeless and sick with an alcohol problem. Jolene found herself at the centre of what the tabloids would call a 'tug-of-love' triangle. Wayne was trying to wheedle his way back into the life of daughter Fallon Rogers, herself a singer with the band Little White Lies. But was he also using his undoubted charms to pluck at Jolene's expansive heart strings? Her current husband, Sid, certainly thought so. Sid knows that he has a diamond in Jolene - still a fine figure of a woman, as Joe Grundy might put it. She's no mean businesswoman either. Since she replaced Kathy as landlady, Jolene has devoted her warm personality and generous 'assets' (tabloid-ese again) to building up trade and helping to fend off the effects of recession.

KATHY PERKS

(formerly Holland) April Cottage • Born 30.1.53

A keen cricketer for most of his life, Sid coaches at Loxley Barratt Primary and still takes an interest in the Ambridge team. Distaste is not strong enough for his feelings towards Jolene's former husband, Wayne Tucson, whose extended stay at The Bull nearly drove him to distraction.

HEATHER PRITCHARD

Prudhoe, Northumberland

nce a mother, always a mother, but the distance from Borsetshire to Northumberland means that Ruth Archer doesn't get as much hands-on mothering and grand-mothering as Heather would probably like. Widowed since 2002, Heather has a thriving social life and is quite comfortably off, as can be deduced from the number of cruises she takes. It's an interest she shares with relatively newfound friend Jim Lloyd, father of Ruth's brother-in-law Alistair. Does that make him father-in-law-in-law? And will their friendship flourish on one of Heather's visits to Ambridge, where Jim seems to be settling? We shall see...

FALLON ROGERS

The Bull • Born 19.6.85

Tallon's musical career hit a discordant period, for practical and personal reasons. The practical problem of substituting Finn in her band, Little White Lies, was compounded by the personal problem of dealing with her wayward Dad Wayne Tucson, who turned up in her life unexpectedly. Wayne knows about the music scene, having been on the road with his guitar for most of Fallon's life. Indeed, he abandoned her and her mother Jolene when Fallon was a toddler. No wonder she was, initially at least, bitterly resistant to his attempts to make it up to her after he stumbled back into her life and she brought him home to The Bull. Fallon is popular with young and old in Ambridge, as the promoter of music nights 'Upstairs@The Bull' and musical director of village shows. GRAHAM RYDER

Borchester

(Malcolm McKee)

s a land agent working for the Borchester Ifirm of Rodway and Watson, Graham used to supervise the management of the Estate's 'inhand' farmland. He was less than gruntled when Matt Crawford passed that role to Debbie Aldridge in 2006, leaving Graham with little more than collecting the quarterly rent from Bridge Farm - and even that task went when Pat and Tony Archer bought their freehold. Graham can't quite understand why he is so unpopular in Ambridge. He sees himself as courteous and conscientious but others interpret that as oily and nit-picking. Invoking the health and safety laws in a way that nearly closed down the village pantomime did little to boost his rankings in the local popularity stakes.

A large but obviously rather quiet band, they include the ageing Mrs Potter and Mr Pullen at Manorfield Close; Lower Loxley's gardener Edgar Titcombe and housekeeper Eileen Titcombe and resident falconer Jessica; Eddie Grundy's friends Baggy and Fat Paul; Home Farm workers Andy and Jeff; William Grundy's deputy Pete; exotic Anja at Ambridge Organics; no-nonsense Naomi, Polish waitress Ottie and burger flipper Frank at Jaxx Caff; bell-ringer Neville Booth and his unpopular nephew Nathan; Ambridge Golf Club's director of golf Leigh Barham; the very fit Sabrina Thwaite and her husband Richard: the Button family; parish council chair Derek Fletcher; many of the Horrobins; and those latter-day femmes fatales Mandy Beesborough and Freda Fry.

LYNDA SNELL

Ambridge Hall • Born 29.5.47

(Carole Boyd)

ynda is looking forward to being an inspiration to the new baby delivered by Coriander, husband Robert's daughter. But how will she find the time? Bustling with energy as ever, she was getting up at the crack of dawn in summer to work on the memorial garden with fellow insomniac Elizabeth Pargetter. Since Elizabeth persuaded sculptor Anthony Gormley to attend the village fete, Linda's admiration for her has known no bounds. The arts are one of Lynda's great passions. At Christmas she has brought her talents as a theatre director to the village panto. Rampant hay fever every summer is no barrier to her environmental activism most recently opposing Adam Macy's plans to extend his poly-tunnels.
